

# FAITH NEEDS TO BE TAUGHT AT HOME

In addressing the concerns and challenges of St. Anthony's parish, Pastor Reverend Oscar Martin Dominguez shared his insights into the role that God plays in today's society. Even though the church can foster one's faith, he laments that it cannot "Give Faith." "Faith," he says, "is no longer being taught in the home as it once was."

Rev. Oscar is completing his first year as Pastor of St. Anthony of Padua Church in Elizabeth, New Jersey. He was born in Malaga, Spain and studied Civil Engineering before coming to America to pursue his vocation as a priest. Ordained in 2001, he spent his first two years in West New York, New Jersey, followed by a year in the Caribbean, five years in Bayonne, New Jersey and then five years in Boston, Massachusetts before coming to St. Anthony's on September 1, 2014. Rev. Oscar speaks Spanish, Italian, and English which is a skillset appropriate for his diverse congregation.

The Church dates back to 1896 and has been the cornerstone of the Peterstown Community which started with a wave of Italian immigrants arriving around that period. The parish grew over time and peaked in the 1970's. It then started to decline in participation. It was a trend happening to all faiths all over the county. Peterstown also experienced a changeover of residents adding to the loss of parishioners.

Rev. Oscar begins a new era for St. Anthony's. He is a diocesan priest serving the Archdiocese of Newark, not a member of any specific order. He was assigned to St. Anthony's in the wake of the Salesians of Don Bosco ending their ministry at the parish which began in 1925. And so there are a myriad of changes to deal with on many levels. He is addressing local concerns in a global environment, both which are rapidly changing.

One of the first things that Rev. Oscar dealt with was the physical problems of the beautiful church. The roof, which was damaged by Superstorm Sandy in 2012, was in need of repair, as well as the interior damage caused by the water. It has been thirty years since a major renovation has been done so it has been long overdue. The repair has given the new pastor the opportunity to change elements of design in what he describes as "changing from dark to light." He saw that the church was rather dark and so he improved the lighting and chose to paint the walls white. A new sound system was added and new rugs along with other design changes are in the works. They are being completed as funds are raised to pay for them.

Retention and recruitment of parishioners are Rev. Oscar's main concern. Since the congregation is so diverse, services must have a broader appeal. Eliminating the Italian mass on Sunday made managerial sense but was disappointing to the Italian contingency. On the flip side there

are more Italian cultural events involving the Church, for instance processions through the streets of the Peterstown neighborhood celebrating feast days of the Blessed Mother, St. Anthony, and St. Vito. The St. Vito procession culminates in an Italian street fair lasting four days. Rev. Oscar's trilingual ability enables him to preside over cross culture events.

The clubs and committees once prevalent and staffed by volunteers have gone dorment. Most recently, the Senior Club in January 2015 followed by the St. Ann Society. The Church does run a food panty and a youth soccer club which are recent additions and the

Youth Center is active once again with evening programs and open gym nights. There is also a Spanish prayer group meeting. It is common for people to have difficulty accepting change, but Rev. Oscar has experienced an accepting response to the changes being made. Parishioners have been supportive and helpful. Rev. Oscar's philosophy is to be approachable. He would like for everyone to understand that the church is there for them and not the other way around. Families that are burdened by the pressures of today's culture should find relief from the church not additional burdens. Faith is not being taught in the homes like it once was. Children are not being raised in an environment where the concept of God's love is practiced. The family structure deteriorates with each generation. As a result people live in despair and have lost their faith.



Rev. Oscar does have hope. He believes that if people understand what is to live in faith and understand the idea of God's love their lives will improve along with the lives of the people they associate with.

The Catholic Church has a new leader in Pope Francis who comes across as a man of the people. His down-to-earth style has been received positively and many people are heading his words. Maybe it is the push regular folks need to put their houses in order.

## **Editor's Opinion** by Joe Renna

I had a conversation with St. Anthony's Pastor. Reverend Oscar Martin Dominguez. We touched upon many subjects concerning the church and the challenges he has as pastor. The conversation eventually turned to the broader picture of people's understanding of God and the lack of faith in today's culture. Fr. Oscar says that faith must first be taught in the home before if can be cultivated in the school or church.

It is almost impossible for children to develop proper behavior without values, morals and ethics being taught in the home. Children learn by example and their lives will reflect the environment in which they are raised. The collapse of the family structure is one of the main causes for the child's disconnect.

So much stress is due to the a person's priorities being out of order. There is a pursuit of possessions, wealth and leisure that is being put ahead of spiritual wellness. These pursuits put a burden on the individual. Technology has created even a bigger distraction.

The majority of burdens people face are self imposed. Satisfaction is never achieved. Today's society has taught us that we never have enough and so our energy is spent on increasing our material wealth, but this has come at the cost of humanitarian pursuits. People are defining their lives by the burdens they carry.

For those of little faith, the church is viewed as a burden. The idea that to live in accordance to the word of God one must subject himself to a whole list of rules that the church lays down. Its a popular concept but it is also extremely inaccurate. The true concept is that God's love is unconditional. Our most basic needs, physical and spiritual, can be fulfilled in much simpler ways. The

solution to living a fulfilled life is in getting our priorities in order with "loving thy neighbor" being number one.

Many people get caught up in the semantics of religious speech. They are missing the point of the message. There is no easy way to describe the concept of God's love. Generosity, forgiveness, and compassion, are just a few of many examples of how God's love is manifested. There is no room for greed, vengeance, or oppression when living a righteous life.

I was lucky to have been raised in Peterstown where the same positive values were shared by an entire community. God, family and community were stressed. As a community we cared for one another and made sure no one was in need. St. Anthony's Church was at the center of the community and facilitated the effort.

Today the idea of community has been replaced by individual achievement. We can see it even in youth sports where personal statistics are more important than team records. Its like that in society. But what happens to those who don't make the team? They are left alone to fend for themselves.

Rev. Oscar hopes to educate others about having faith, get them to shed their burdens. It has become in vogue to mock religion and a belief in God. It seems every comedian, academic and pseudo-intellectual has some snarky comment about religious dogma. What I don't hear from them is an alternative way to accomplish what the church does. Is any segment of society teaching values, morals and ethics to the next generation? People seem to help only when there some personal gain to be made.

### WELCOME TO MARIOOCH'S KITCHEN!

Mary Nigro's dad Mike used to call her Mariooch. Mary says she got the Italian cooking gene from her grandmother, Maria Libertà Nigro (nee Nufrio). She has many fond memories of cooking with her grandmother and her aunts in the family kitchen. Over the past 16 years she has honed this skill and become what she calls a "homegrown chef".

Cooking has become Mary's passion and she started a website named marioochskitchen.com so she can record lost or almost forgotten recipes. She has started a stock piling from her past. She writes on the blog daily and also is a volunteer chef at a local pre-school for homeless children.

The essence of the blog is to share healthy, relatively easy to follow, delicious recipes for family style meals that can be adapted to meet a family's needs and tastes.

She would like to help busy families, pressed for time, who want to provide healthy meals to their families. Her focus is on Italian dishes, all-American fare, as well as some international dishes. Typically, the recipes only have 5-6 ingredients and there are not too many steps to follow. Too many steps adds up to too many dishes!

### Recipes

### **Eggplant Parmesan**

#### INGREDIENTS

2 Medium sized Eggplant Seasoned Breadcrumbs Salt 1 1/2 cans of Crushed Tomato Extra Virgin Olive Oil 1 Onion (diced) Garlic Cloves 1/2 cup freshly grated Parmesan Cheese Crushed Oregano Salt and a pinch of Sugar Tomato Paste Parmesan Cheese Mozzarella Cheese

#### PREPARATION (SAUCE)

- 1. Put crushed tomato into blender along with some extra virgin olive oil and pulse for 30 seconds.
- 2. Saute 1 diced onion and a few cloves of garlic extra virgin olive oil. Cook until slightly translucent. (do not brown)
- 3. Add to the blender with the sauce, and pulse about one minute.
- 4. Pour sauce to a pot and simmer for about 15 minutes.
- 5. Add 1/2 cup of parmesan cheese, crushed oregano, salt and a pinch of sugar.
- 6. Continue to simmer and drizzle more olive oil and add tomato paste.

#### PREPARATION (EGGPLANT)

- 1. Wash eggplant then cut off skin, slice thinly
- 2. Salt eggplant and allow moisture sweat out.
- 3. Pour about 1 cup of all-purpose flour into a small bowl. Mix 4 eggs together and put in a separate bowl. (repeat as neded).
- 4. Dip eggplant into flour and then the egg, then dip into a breadcrumb mixture, if you prefer the eggplant breaded. This is great for the Eggplant towers.)
- 5. Heat a little olive oil in a large frying pan that will fit about six pieces of eggplant. Place eggplant in pan and cook and turn over until golden brown.
- 6. Place onto a cookie sheet covered with paper towels, to absorb the oil.
- 7. Layer in a deep dish starting with a laddle of sauce followed by a layer the eggplant then sprinckled with

### **Ricotta Cheesecake**

INGREDIENTS 2 1/2 lbs Ricotta Cheese (part skim or whole) 2 cups Sugar 1/2 cup White Flour 1 teaspoon Vanilla 8 eggs 2 1/2 cups of Graham Cracker Crust (Nabisco) 1 1/2 sticks of Margarine 1/4 teaspoon Anisette (optional) 12 inch cake pan 1 small container Strawberries 1 small container Blueberries 1 jar Strawberry Jam

#### PREPARATION

- 1. Combine 2 1/2 cups of graham crackers crumbs with 1 1/4 stick melted margarine and a few tablespoons of water and mix well, then press it firmly into a 12 inch non-stick pan. Use the back of a spoon to smooth it out. It you like the crust a bit more crunchy put the crust in the oven for 8-10 minutes to cook.
- 2) Put about 2 lbs. to 2 1/2 lbs. of ricotta cheese in a large bowl.
- 3) Separate the egg yokes, Beat and add them to the ricotta cheese.
- 4) In a separate bowl, mix the flour and sugar together.
- 5) Using a mixer, mix all ingredients together, adding the vanilla and the well beaten egg whites. Add a hint of anisette or Italian Liquor if desired.
- 6) Mix well until it is creamy and smooth
- Pour the mixture into the pan. Extra mixture can be cooked in a seperate pan with no crust.
- 8) Preheat oven to 350 degrees.
- 9) Put the pan in the center of the oven and cook for 1 hour and 15 minutes or until the center is firm to the touch.
- Turn off the oven and leave the pan in for another 20-30 minutes until firm to the touch and golden brown.
- 11) Cool for 10-15 minutes then remove from pan and place on wire rack.
- 12) Let cool on a wire rack for approximately one hour. Once cooled, chill for at least for 4 hours,
- 13) Slice and Serve with a dusting of white powdered sugar or arrange sliced strawberries and blueberries in



8. Cover and place in a 350 degree oven for about 35-40 minutes on the middle rack. Take the cover off the last 10 minutes. Cook until eggplant is golden color on top and the sauce is bubbling. Let it rest a few minutes, then cut into into portions.



### **JOHN RIGGI PASSES AT AGE 90**

John M. Riggi passed away on August 3, 2015 at home his caring children, Emanuel P. Riggi (Susan), Vincent J. in Edison surrounded by his family. He was 90 years old. His wake was held at Corsentino's Funeral Home followed by a funeral mass at St. Anthony's Church in Elizabeth, New Jersey. St. Anthony's is the cornerstone of the Peterstown neighborhood which was the focus of Riggi's philanthropy.

Mr. Riggi served as the business agent for the International Laborers Local #394 of Elizabeth for twenty-five years before retiring in 1988. He dedicated his life to his family and is survived by


