WHEN THE HELPING HAND NEEDS A HAND

Sal Coppa made a full-time commitment to community service. Over the years he volunteered for numerous organizations and helped countless causes. His generosity and dedication to the Peterstown community and the City of Elizabeth is unmeasurable. Now, he is the one in need and the community is responding.

Sal Coppa never asked for anything in return and never took credit for all the good that he did. He was never in the lime light. Most people outside the neighborhood, even those that he has helped, don't know who he is or what he looks like. Sal is a low-key individual, quiet and unassuming. His demeanor was one of patience, and measured control. Tense situations do not fluster him. He faces challenges head on and works toward solutions. Many of those challenges were centered on how to help others. This is why it was so shocking to everyone who knew Sal when he suffered a major heart attack at the age of 51.

It happened on the steps of Elizabeth City Hall. The occasion was the raising of the Italian flag commemorating Columbus Day on October 9, 2013, and Sal had just stepped away from the podium after speaking when he fell.

Luckily Sal was surrounded by friends who came quickly to his aid. Steve Rinaldi fetched a public defibrillator from the City Hall lobby and it is attributed with keeping Sal alive until the ambulance arrived. EMT workers said that he red-lined twice while on the steps, meaning he had no pulse. Sal was rushed to Trinitas Hospital, just a few blocks away. News spread of Sal's condition and soon the Hospital lobby was filled with friends and neighbors. Sal's wife Cindy got the call and nervously drove to


the hospital from Madison, NJ, about an hour away. She was thinking the worst and praying it wasn't.

One could imagine her shock when she was greeted at the door of the hospital by not only her friends and neighbors but hospital personnel from department heads to the president. You see, Sal touched so many lives with his charity that there was a great desire to give back.

Sal spent weeks in ICU. Infections complicated an already tense situation. A tooth that he swallowed caused an infection and had to be extracted from his lung. Other infections ensued. Sal was not responding. The outlook was bleak and not many people thought that Sal was going to survive. They hinted to Cindy to not get her hopes up. That advice, though, was ignored. If nothing else, Sal and Cindy had faith and they had many people who loved them. A virtual army of people began praying for Sal day and night. Cindy spent a month at his bedside while visitors relayed updates of Sal's condition to waiting friends on Facebook. The news that Sal moved a finger resulted in great joy to many.

And so it was, minute by minute, day by day, another hint of progress was reported. There was a day when his doctor entered the room and Sal looked at him and asked "What's up?" Cindy said the doctor almost fell back like a prat fall in a slap stick comedy. From that point on more people were believing that Sal's recovery was possible, not just the faithful. This put the praying into overdrive, even one of the doctors told Cindy that he was praying for Sal every day.


Sal went back and forth between floors in the hospital spending time in different departments depending on what the most urgent need was, surgery, transfusions, ICU, etc.



The ordeal has taken a toll on the Coppa family and it is nowhere near being over. This has led to all those organizations and people that Sal helped wanting to give back. A fundraiser is planned for Saturday, February 8, 2014, to be held in the cafeteria of Our Lady of Guadeloupe Academy on the grounds of St. Anthony's Church. 

JOE COLLETTI RECEIVES GRETA SHERIDAN MEMORIAL COMMUNITY SERVICE AWARD

The Joseph Nugent Sr. Association of Union County held its 80th annual dance on Saturday, November 16 at the Kenilworth Veterans Center located at 33 South 21st Street in Kenilworth , NJ. The Joseph Nugent, Sr. Association is the oldest independent Irish-American Association in the state of NJ. It was founded in 1933 by Joseph & Nora Nugent, proprietors of Nugent's Tavern on Newark Avenue in Elizabeth. The Association is noted for its charitable endeavors and each year sponsors an Irish picnic for the benefit of the Make-A-Wish Foundation. It has also made contributions to the Center for Hope Hospice and the Deborah Hospital. They work continuously to "Keep the Tradition Alive".

Some of the traditions that the Nugent Association wants to maintain is based in Irish culture. Dancing is an important part of the events and celebrations in the Irish community and the unique style has been passed down for generations. The Nugent Association wanted to make sure that tradition continued.

Greta Sheridan volunteered for the many charitable

events that the association held throughout the year. Her passion and talent lay in Irish Dance. She spent countless hours teaching the craft to a new crop of girls year after year.

Greta was certified by the Irish Dancing Council in Ireland and soon many organizations were asking for her assistance. She never refused to help, and most time she donated her time, especially if the purpose of the dance was to help a non-profit organization or a person in serious medical trouble.

Greta started to feel sick during a dance competition in 1997. It was eventually revealed that she had lung cancer. She battled her illness for two years until she passed away on September 28, 1999.

Her generosity and her record of community service was notable and inspirational. So much so that the Nugent Association has named an award in her honor. Tha Greta Sheridan Memorial Community Service Award is given out at the groups annual dinner dance to a person who has proved to have excelled in community service, though volunteering and generosity. The 2013 recipient Joe Colletti has a long history of helping those in need in his personal life and as a member of the Knights of Columbus.







COLLETTI'S A TROVE OF MEMORABILIA

At 85 years old Sebastian Colletti can tell stories of his years growing up in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth New Jersey with detail and insight. He has kept photo and newspaper clippings going back seventy years. He is a real font of history and an enjoyable story teller.

Nutsy, as he was commonly called, was the son of Joseph and Concetta. His parents owned a deli on the corner of Third Avenue and Palmer Street, before it became Parinella's in the mid-1930s.

He is one of eight siblings. It was a second marriage for both his parents and each brought two children in to the union. They then had four more children together.

Nutsy worked at the Union County courthouse in the Juvenile Detention Center for 22 years under Sherriffs Oriscello and Froehlich. He retired in 1990. He also

NUTSY COLLETTI'S SCRAP BOOK CONTAINS 70 YEARS OF LOCAL SPORTS NEWS CLIPPINGS

Sebastian Colletti was better known by his nick name Nutsy when he was with his friends in Peterstown where he grew up, but he was also known as Sibby by those who knew him in bowling circles. Both names appear in numerous articles about his bowling and softball playing ability. He has kept those clippings along with many other family photos and memorabilia in perfect condition for over 70 years.

Nutsy was a fast-pitch softball pitcher for several club and company teams. He worked for Simmons Mattress for fourteen years and played with their team, he also worked for Universal Valve, owned by Angie and Joe Milo, for 5 years. The neighborhood club team from Peterstown that he pitched for in the late 1940's was The Invaders, playing in the city's Single "A" league and

Nutsy liked all sports, basketball, boxing, wrestling but Sibby was especially fond of bowling. He has a collection of box scores from when newspapers had beat reporters covering bowling on a daily basis.

His series average of 755 was newsworthy at the time. It is difficult to compare eras but a 800 series in the 1940's was rare. Because of technology, modern bowling scores are about 100 pins higher than the past. A good indication of this can be seen in a clipping of when Sibby set the alley record in 1959 at Elizabeth Lanes playing for the St. Anthony's squad in the Union County Holy Name League. His series of 736 held the record for five years. His personal best series was a 755. He never turned pro but has played in Pro-Am tournaments. Nutsy can still play ay the age of 85.



DEALING WITH CATS IN OUR OWN BACK YARDS

no-kill policy.

Any kid growing up in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth could count on one thing: you can find just about anything on, in or around "the Crick." And then some. From old coins, "dirty" books, and articles of food, shelter and clothing, it was not only a haven for scavengers, but also a time capsule for both distant and recent ages past.

One of the more lively finds would be the animals traveling through the marsh or mud, and many a house pet began its life by getting rescued in time to save it from a harsh winter or arid summer only to become another member of one of the families in the 'Burg.

Today, while the artifacts might change, one thing remains constant, and even more prevalent. As youths, we considered it playful to find a stray kitten and bring it home to give it a saucer of warm milk and "adopt" it for however long it decided to stick around the backvard. But today, it has become a real problem – both for the health of the animals and the health of the community.

"The new term for a 'stray' is now 'community cat'," said Cathy Marangella Heineman, whose father, Joe Mags, is a Peterstown resident. "As kids, we didn't realize the enormity of the problem – it was just fun to find a little kitten and bring it home. But as adults we now view it as an epidemic."

Cathy first became interested in caring for felines as a kid when her Aunt Jean Bellino, an avid animal lover, would feed stray cats in her backyard in the 1960s. Now 54, Cathy and her husband, Mark, own four domestic cats of their own, all rescued from either the street or a shelter.

"I want to raise awareness of this problem because it simply is not good for the community or the cats," said Cathy, who is a registered nurse. "Whenever I visit my dad, I see colonies of feral cats in his backyard, and if you walk just a little ways down the street, you'll find more numbers down by the river."

Feral cats do have a home, but that home is the outdoors. And while they do appreciate a plateful of food, they are not the kind of cat that will cuddle up with you on your couch.

Cathy has joined with volunteers Linda and Andrea from Elaine's Foundation for Homeless Felines and local Peterstown resident and volunteer, Barbara Petrillo Grecco, to spearhead an effort to trap and neuter colonies of feral cats throughout the city and the state.

The rescue group traps many abandoned cats and kittens in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth. Many of the female cats are pregnant repeatedly (every 63 days) and sometimes while their kittens are still only 8-10 weeks old. Elaine's Foundation takes them in; spays and neuters them (except for the pregnant moms, they will not abort the kittens); treats them for internal and external parasites (fleas and worms); vaccinates and feeds them; and works with the feral cats to socialize them and find them forever homes. This is not a Trap/Neuter/Release (TNR) group — they do not turn

Even though the volunteers have rescued more than 30 cats and kittens, there is work to be done. There are large colonies at City Hall, the Social Services Department on Westminster Ave., and more groups in the north section of Kenilworth. The volunteers are trying to rescue all of them, but need the funds to help. In addition, the rescuers at Elaine's have a lofty goal: to build an adoption center where the cats can roam free and prospective owners can bond with their new pets before taking them home.

The cost for veterinary care and shelter for each rescued cat and kitten is about \$150, so any contribution to offset that cost is welcome. Cathy is the first to acknowledge that there are many worthy places to direct our charitable donations these days, but she is trying to address a local problem as well. Her family has contributed to Elaine's for each of the Elizabeth cats they've "surrendered" through the trapping program.

"I am sleeping better at night, knowing that I've helped in some small way to help put these helpless animals into good hands," she said.

"I hope to do my Aunt Jean proud by having her know that a simple act of kindness extended to our backyard cats 45 years ago, has turned into a community initiative that addresses a very real, growing societal issue."
