# PETERSTOWN FAMILY COMES FULL CIRCLE

Joseph and Angelina Alfano raised their family on Niles Street until they moved in 1952. Sixty-two years later their great-grandson, Tom Fowler Jr., purchased his first home on Niles Street just a block away. The move symbolizes a return to the roots of the lifestyle that made old neighborhoods like Peterstown so special.

The Peterstown section of Elizabeth, New Jersey was populated by Italian immigrants in the beginning of the 1900's and the waves of Italians continued to arrive for another sixty years before waning. In the meantime, many of the first and second generations of arrivals were able to move from the neighborhood to more spacious suburbs.

Elizabeth is a big city and by definition it is densely populated and features multi-family housing. The hosing stock was small but affordable, most suitable for the new arrivals with limited resources. The fact that the subsequent generations elevated themselves out of aging houses and into newer and larger homes with property is a testament to their ability to prosper. Families did not even have to leave Elizabeth to find desirable neighborhoods. The city offered plenty of new homes in emerging neighborhoods towards the north and west end borders. And so when the Alfano family was ready to move they purchased a two-family house at 597 Monroe Avenue in the North End section of town.

Joseph and Angelina raised their seven children there, Charlie, Benny, Nat, Anna, Libby, Tina and Matty. Eventually two siblings remained in the home. Charlie with his wife Lucy lived on the first

floor. Libby and her husband Joe Fowler occupied the second floor. Charlie had two children, Ann Marie and Angela, while Libby raised four, Joanne, Joe Jr., Tom and Donny.

The story turns interesting for the Fowler family. Tom Fowler married Maria Insignalia. They also stayed in Elizabeth, raising their two children, Thomas (TJ) and Allison on Glenwood Avenue.

On August 30, 2012, TJ was welcomed into the Elizabeth Fire Department in a ceremony at City Hall. While he was still in the Academy, TJ would routinely monitor his scanner listening to emergency calls and official communications. One afternoon he heard a broadcasted for a fire at 597 Monroe. The address sounded familiar so he called his dad and asked if he recognized the address. Tom Sr. more than recognized it. It was the home where he grew up. TJ rushed to the scene and even though he was just a cadet he was able to help the Elizabeth Fire Department fight the blaze that affected three houses. The Fowler's old domain was totally destroyed.

TJ would never forget the experience. He was sure there would be some emotional feelings for his father, aunts and uncles. TJ helped roll hose and lug equipment but he saw the work that his future comrades were doing and it reinforced his desire to be a firefighter. A dramatic photo of the fire was featured on the cover of the program at TJ's graduation from the Fire Academy.

When it was time to buy his first home, TJ looked no further than his hometown. He is the fourth generation of his family to call Elizabeth home and is committed to serving his community as a firefighter. What

What he did that was unique is he purchased a house in Peterstown, just a block from where his great-grandparents had lived. The big difference is that his home, like many others, is totally renovated and modernized.

TJ purchased the house that was once owned and occupied by the DeMaio family at 532 Fourth Avenue. The neighborhood has gone through a physical redevelopment with many old homes being razed and replaced by new construction. TJ's move to Peterstown may mark a trend of younger folks seeing the value of living in a close knit neighborhood as opposed to the sprawl of the suburbs.

The value of living in Peterstown over the past century is that residents are surrounded by likeminded people. Neighbors who think community first, before self-interest. The community supported each other though the church and charitable organizations. It was the way Joseph and Angelina taught their children and grandchildren. It is how TJ's father taught him.



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

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## BASKETBALL COURT DEDICATED TO COACH COLICCHIO

On January 7, 2014, in recognition of sixteen years of outstanding service to the City of Linden and the students that matriculated at Linden High School, the Linden Board of Education dedicated the basketball court at Linden High School to Coach Phil Colicchio.

A native of Elizabeth, the youngest of the three sons of Thomas and Beverly Colicchio has become one of the most successful coaches in Union County and New Jersey hoops history. From his high school playing days at St. Mary's and Elizabeth High School, where he was the point guard on the 1984 EHS Union County Championship team through his days coaching the Linden Tigers squad since 1998, he has dedicated his career to teaching young men how to be successful both on and off the court.

His coaching resume is substantial. His first coaching job was on the staff of his high school coach, the legendary Ben Candelino. As the Elizabeth High JV coach, he won eight Union County Championships. After a successful year as the head man at Barringer High School in Newark, the Linden Board of Education, Principal Joe Martino and Mayor John Gregorio convinced him that Linden was the right place to be. In sixteen years stomping the Linden sidelines he has won the only three Group IV State Championships in Linden history (2000, 2006 and 2007), five Group IV State Sectional Championships, seven Watchung Conference Championships and two Union County Championships both significant upsets over heavily favored St. Patrick's. He has won almost 450 games in his 25 years of coaching including 330 at Linden.

Phil brings much more to the table than meets the eye. As pointed out by MSG announcer Mike Quick at the dedication ceremony, this level of success does not come without personal sacrifice. There were many times when his job and team came before his wife Laila and children Tommy, Alyssa and Gia. Dividing his time between his vocation and family is a balancing act that is not always easy but is easily understood and accepted.

The reigning Union County Coach of the Year attributes his success to many. Coaches such as Jerry Moore and Bob Firestone with whom he worked at Elizabeth High, Linden officials such as the aforementioned and Al Volpe and Antoinette Modrak, players such as Desmond Wade, LJ McGhee, Jamaal Tate, Greg Parker, Danny Del Valle, Mo Wilkerson and Darryl Lampley, assistant coaches such as John Hutchinson, Marty Luc, Monte Brooks and Anthony Drejaj, the amazingly loyal fans of the Linden Tigers, his brothers Mike and Tom whom allowed him to tag along with them as a boy and his loving parents and wife all have been given credit for forging the man and coach that he has become.









### Aji de Gallina

Aji de Gallina is a spicy stew made of shredded non-laying hen and aji pepper in a spicy creamy sauce. The dish is traced back to the Inca times, where a type of bird called "Hualpa" was cooked and shredded with an aji sauce. Also, after the French Revolution, many chefs lost their jobs and traveled to Peru, where they started working for the wealthy Criollo families and brought their French recipes and techniques that later were fused with Peruvian dishes.

That is why Aji de Gallina can also be called Spicy Peruvian Chicken Fricasse. Traditionally the dish is made with non-laying hen, but in actual times, most people cook it with chicken, there are also other variations, instead of chicken, seafood and shellfish could be used.

Aji de gallina is one of my favorite dishes and so easy to prepare. It has always been a controversy with my family as of the color of the aji de gallina. My mom and my aunts have learned from my grandmother to cook it with Aji Colorado and the finished color is reddish. They say that is the traditional and right way, but I love it with Aji Mirasol and the finished yellow color that is most commonly cooked in Lima.

Either color, this is a delicious dish I would love to share with you. Provecho!

After she and her family moved to the U.S., Marita decided to professionally pursue her life's passion and attended the Institute of Culinary Education in New York City, where she graduated with high honors. She then trained and worked at a number of highly acclaimed restaurants, including Jean Georges, Daniel Boulud's Feast and Fetes Catering, The Ryland Inn, and The Bernards Inn in New Jersey.

#### **INGREDIENTS:**

- 4 whole chicken breasts
- 4 cups chicken stock
- 1 carrot chopped
- 1 piece celery leaves
- 1 Bay leaf
- ¼ cup Canola oil
- 1 med chopped white onion 3 cloves garlic, chopped
- $1 \\ tsp \\ cumin$
- 1/4 cup Aji mirasol paste ½ loaf sliced white bread

without the crust

- 1½ cup milk
- 1/3 cup parmesan cheese

Salt and pepper to taste

#### **GARNISH:**

- 3 potatoes
- 3 hard boil eggs, sliced (could be Cornish eggs) Botija Olives or Black Olives

#### PREPARATION

- 1) Cook chicken breast with 4 cups of chicken stock, carrots and celery leaves in a pot on medium heat, simmering for about 40 minutes. Once cooked, let the chicken cool. Shred the chicken into bite-size pieces. Reserve two cups of the stock.
- 2) In a bowl, crumble the bread, soak in the milk and put the mixture in the blender to form a panada that will bind the dish.
- 3) In a medium pan, heat canola oil and sauté onion until translucent, then add garlic, cumin and aji mirasol paste, cook well for 5 minutes.
- 4) Add the soaked bread mixture, season with salt and pepper. Cook for another 10 minutes, then add slowly the hot chicken stock, stirring constantly, making sure to get a creamy consistency. Add stock each time the sauce thickens too much.
- 5) Finally add the shredded chicken, parmesan cheese and walnuts. Add a little more stock if necessary, gently mixing so the chicken pieces stay intact. Simmer for 8 minutes. Adjust seasoning.
- 6) Serve hot with a side of white rice and sliced potatoes. Garnish with olives and hard boiled eggs slices.
