



SUMMIT FAMILY AQUATIC CENTER WINS INTERNATIONAL MARKETING AWARD

The City of Summit's Family Aquatic Center was once again recognized by the World Waterpark Association with their Wave Review Award for Excellence in Promotion. This year's award for a facility with fewer than 100,000 visitors was for the City's promotional work on the World's Largest Swim Lesson. The City of Summit is no stranger to the Wave Review Award having won three Wave Review Awards in 2015 and one in 2014. This year's award was presented at the 2016 World Waterpark Association's Annual Conference in New Orleans, LA.

The City of Summit was recognized for their comprehensive marketing and promotions plan for the World's Largest Swim Lesson held on Friday, June 24, 2016. Over 80 children participated in this worldwide day of free swim lessons and safety instruction. The City was recognized for their video production pieces promoting the event, event coverage, social media campaign and print media about the event.

The World's Largest Swim Lesson was held at the Summit Family Aquatic Center. The event was a City wide effort including The Connection, Summit Area YMCA, Hometowne TV, New Wave Swim School, Summit Police, Fire and EMS.

Judith Leblein Josephs, Director of the Department of Community Programs accepted the award on behalf of the City's Family Aquatic Center. Upon accepting the award, Ms. Josephs stated, "this was a total team effort between all the agencies in the City that work towards teaching children to be safe in and around the water."

The mantra of the World Waterpark Association resonated throughout the summer at the Family Aquatic Center, "Swim Lesson Save Lives." The best proof that raising awareness works came on Labor Day 2016. As the Family Aquatic Center closed down for the season, it officially became the First season in recorded history to have not a single lifeguard assist or rescue. Everything from swim lessons and swim testing for children to our award winning lifejacket program played a role in helping us have the safest season ever.



SUMMIT STUDENTS BUILD SCHOOLHOUSE, PLAYGROUND IN GUATEMALA

Isabelle Kenny and Christina (Nina) Maurizi, both of Summit, and schoolmates from Oak Knoll School of the Holy Child, spent part of their summer building a schoolhouse and playground for children in Guatemala. They journeyed to the village of Santa Cruz del Quiche in Guatemala during a nine-day trip in July through the School the World organization's Student Service Learning Program.

Kenny and Maurizi spent the trip painting the school and assisting in the construction of the playground, which included pouring cement, hanging swings and painting monkey bars. Both students said they hoped the experience would afford them the opportunity to effect change.



"In our search for a service trip with hands-on work, we found that with School the World we would be directly working toward change and helping to provide an education to children less fortunate than we are," Kenny said.

"I know how secure I feel to be able to sit in a school room and build a relationship with a teacher, and I think it's important for every child to experience that relationship," Maurizi agreed.

Reflecting back on the trip, Kenny said she'll

never forget the "joyful welcome" and tearful goodbye the Guatemalan students gave them.

"No one told us how hard it would be to say goodbye. We felt such a connection with the children and their families. I was crying when we left," Maurizi said.

Founded in 2009, School the World has built nearly 40 schools and trained more than a 150 teachers in Guatemala and Honduras, according to its website.



ATTORNEY SETTLES HOME EXPLOSION LITIGATION FOR \$975,000.00

Attorney David C. Bendush announced settlement of a lawsuit arising from a home explosion in Hunterdon County in September of 2014. The blast was caused by a contractor who was converting the home of his clients, from oil to natural gas. The clients were in the home with their infant daughter at the time of the explosion and fire. Davis Heating and Cooling was attempting without success to purge the new gas lines. Large amounts of natural gas were caused to accumulate inside the basement until the gas exploded, nearly levelling the structure and knocking the clients to the ground where they stood. Mr. Bendush litigated the liability issues aggressively, and attained the unusual result of summary judgment for plaintiff. The defense had little choice but to settle quickly and on favorable terms, in order to avoid a trial.



ADVOCATES NEEDED FOR LOCAL FOSTER YOUTH: CASA OFFERS NEW FLEX-TRAININGS IN DEC, JAN

CASA of Union County is seeking Summit residents to step up and be the voice for one of the nearly 600 Union County youth, ages 0-21, currently in foster care through no fault of their own.

Traditionally, the required 30-hour training is held over six weeks, with volunteers meeting several evenings each week. However, two new training options are now available, in response to prospective volunteers seeking more scheduling flexibility. A December training — which begins Monday, Dec. 5, 2016 — allows those home during the day to complete all training within five days from 9 am to 4 pm at the CASA offices; the January training — which begins Thursday, Jan. 12 — continues the traditional six-week format, but incorporates online learning at the volunteer's convenience, and fewer in-person sessions. Lunch or light dinner is provided. At the conclusion of training, a Superior Court judge swears in the new child advocates at the Union County Courthouse.

to foster parents, teachers, doctors, lawyers, therapists and more. CASAs visit the youth regularly and incorporate findings into a report for the judge. They attend quarterly court hearings, working to ensure a youth's time in care is as short as possible and their best interests remain the priority. Although not required, there is an additional need for male advocates and advocates who speak Spanish. Just who is a typical child referred to CASA of Union County? Meet 12-year-old Marissa:

When my mother was pregnant with me, she drank alcohol and used cocaine, and I was born with Fetal Alcohol Syndrome. Even though the state was working with my mom to help her get clean and be a better mom to me and my brother, she couldn't stay away from the drugs and alcohol. My older brother tried to take care of me, but he said it was too hard, and our house was so dirty and cluttered. A worker from the state came and took me, and put me into a foster home. That

Trained CASAs are court-empowered to speak worker left and I have a new worker. When I met her, she said the plan was for me to go back with my mom as soon as she's better. I was so happy. But I just found out that now my mom is missing! I'm so worried and hope she's okay. Is she drinking again? Is she hurt? Every day I wonder what will happen to me and what's happened to her. I'm so scared. I don't see my brother anymore at all. My family is so broken and I feel all alone.

AFFORDABLE HOUSING PRESENTATION **BY LEAGUE OF WOMEN VOTERS**

Affordable Housing presentation by League of Women Voters.

The League of Women Voters of Berkeley Heights, New Providence and Summit is sponsoring a public meeting around Affordable Housing. The meeting will be held on Thursday, November 10th at 7:30pm at the De Corso Community Center, 15 East Fourth Street in New Providence.

Vito A. Gallo, former housing authority

director and a professional planner will be the keynote speaker. The title of his presentation is Hitting the Restart Button on Affordable Housing. A March 2015 decision of the NJ Supreme Court has hundreds of municipalities amending their Master Plans. After years of inaction, Affordable Housing is back in the forefront of local agendas.

TRYCAN PROGRAM AWARDED AGENCY AND ADMINISTRATOR AWARDS

The Summit Community Programs TryCAN Program was recently awarded two prestigious awards at the New Jersey Commission on Recreation for Individuals with Disabilities' (NJ CRID) Annual Conference. NJ CRID is dedicated to the statewide development and implementation of recreation and leisure services for individuals with disabilities, promoting and supporting recreation, and related services, through education and advocacy.

The New Jersey Distinguished Agency Recreation Services Award was given to TryCAN and the Summit Department of Community Programs. This award is presented annually to an agency that has developed outstanding recreation programs and services that demonstrate a commitment to the integration of people with and without disabilities. NJ CRID felt that TryCAN is an exemplary model for replication by other agencies and organizations.

In addition, TryCAN Coordinator Kevin Taylor received the Dr. Jacquelyn "Jacquie" Stanley Professional Administrator Award. This new NJ CRID award was presented to Kevin Taylor for consistently exhibiting leadership skills, serving as a role model, and for having a passion for the development and implementation of innovative, inclusive therapeutic recreation programs. Mr. Taylor was recognizes as well for being a mentor and catalyst for inspiring other Therapeutic Recreation Professionals in the pursuit of serving all individuals with disabilities.

Prior to TryCAN's start in 2007; children with special needs had limited opportunities to participate in activities throughout the community, particularly in recreation and social programs. In response to this need, a group of Summit parents formed TryCAN with the goal to educate and train the local community to understand and actively include children with disabilities in recreational, social, and vocational activities.

Nine years later, TryCAN is now an awardwinning collaboration of more than 12 communities. All programs incorporate trained Peer Mentors in a "kids helping kids" approach. These typical teenage volunteers are paired up with special needs children to boost their confidence while they tackle new sports and demonstrate improved social and other life skills.

More than 900 students to date have completed the necessary Peer Mentor Training session and many have gone on to volunteer with TryCAN. Mentors are instrumental to the success of this program and serve as a bridge to inclusion for TryCAN children within the school system and within the community at large, while learning more about diversity in others.

In accepting the awards, Kevin Taylor, TryCAN Co-founder and Coordinator of the TryCAN/Summit DCP programs, remarked, "We feel honored to be recognized by NJ CRID and our peer for doing what we feel is a privilege for us; serving youth with unique needs." "We humbly accept these awards on behalf of our kids, Peer Mentors, Coaches and the communities in our TryCAN Collaboration."
