GET TO KNOW ANDREA, THEN JOE

Joe Percario, Jr. is a general contractor who coyly put forth the question "Do you know Joe?" in a marketing campaign. If someone really wanted to know Joe they would have to know his grandfather, Andrea. Because, like many grandchildren of immigrants, Joe's success has as much to do with his grandfather as it does his dad.

The story of the three generations of Percarios in America is fascinating and inspiring. The story begins in the Italian town of Pescopennataro located in the Province of Isernia, in the Abruzzi Region at the turn of the century. World War I took its toll on the town. Men either left to fight in the war or to find work. Many women, including Andrea's mother, were left to provide for their children. When his father, a stone cutter and mason, died in a construction accident, Andrea became the man of the house though he was barely a teenager. The mountainous town had little to offer in means to make a living. Andrea Percario worked any way he could to help his mother.

The most he could do was gather wood for fuel. He shared his memories of his youth with his son Joe, Sr. He told of having to walk to the forest five miles from town to gather sticks, bind them and carry them back.

Andrea also recalled the extreme poverty that he was living in. He once wrote about his experience growing up and reflected on a day he had no lunch and ate berries and drank water from the stream. He wrote "I hardly made it home that day with the bundles of wood I had to carry."

When he was just 14 years old he was summoned into the Italian Army and served as an infantryman. Those with any means at all left town, either to other countries or to more industrial parts of Italy. In the late 1920's Andrea traveled to America and landed in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth, NJ, home of other families from Abruzzi. He had no skills or work experience but was determined to make a good life for himself and take care of his mother back home.

He met Lucy Spirito, through an introduction made by her Uncle Charlie. Charlie would then sit between them on movie dates. Lucy and Andrea were married in St. Anthony's Church. In a few years they had a son, their only child, Joe.

Andrea, now Andy in America, taught himself to read and write in English, and eventually to speak Spanish and Portuguese. He also taught himself carpentry while struggling to make ends meet doing odd jobs as a laborer and on the railroad.

Every evening he would build scale models of houses figuring out the correct construction techniques. After a few years he was good enough to join the Carpenter's Union. There was some work but not enough. A part of that was due to his ethnicity. Italians were the newbies and had little leverage to break into the establishments. So, to supplement his income, Andy created a side business selling frankfurters and lemonade from a cart. It was a grueling endeavor. Every Saturday morning he would push his cart from its shanty on High Street to the outdoor market. But first he had to make a trip to the ice house on the banks of the Elizabeth River and stock up for the day.

On Sundays he would rise at 5:00 a.m. so he could attend services at St. Anthony's. He would then push his frankfurter cart to the stadium in Warinanco Park in Roselle, a two mile trek. The first leg of the journey was up the South Street hill, a thirty degree incline, followed by a dip under the train trestle with another steep slope.

Andrea would enlist kids to help him up the slope, in exchange for a few hot dogs. When no kids were around, he would zigzag his way up and down the inclines on his own.


Andrea was also a proud member of the Holy Name Society. Joe, Sr. remembers his father missing mass just two times in his life. Joe would know because he helped his father every weekend, starting from when he was 8 years old. Joe remembers pulling ice, removing and greasing the wheels of the cart and pushing the cart. In the market Joe would use a razor to slice open buns. His father would have to sell about 100 hot dogs to make \$10. He also bought shopping bags for 1ϕ and sold them for 2ϕ , making an extra dollar for the day.

Andrea sent much of the money he earned back to his mother in Italy

She was always in his thoughts and prayers. Andrea did not have much in material things to give his son but he did give him guidance to achieve his own dreams. By example, Andrea taught his son that he could persevere through hard work and dedication.

Today his grandson, Joe, Jr., is at the helm of the contracting business his father Joe, Sr. started in 1953. For the last 11 years it has been ranked nationally in the top 500 by Qualified Remodeler Magazine. A business born from Andrea teaching himself to swing a hammer in his basement in his spare time.

Editor's Opinion

everybody has one - this is mine - by Joe Renna

There is a fantastic mini-series currently being aired on HBO based on the book, John Adams, by American historian David McCullough. The show is excellent on many levels technically and creatively, but its most compelling aspect is the story itself. It goes beyond just a historical account of what happened as the United States was formed to how the founders were feeling.

The viewer, or the reader in regards to the book, was put into the position of the founding fathers and the situation was not pretty. The experience of being oppressed, persecuted and impoverished was made quite distinctly.

It was a dire situation to be in. Yet our founding fathers persevered, beyond what seemed insurmountable odds. They overcame by way of their intellect and fortitude. Their strength came from their belief that what they were doing was right.

The most inspirational line of the movie for me was by John Adams explaining to the French bourgeois that he has not had the opportunity to see an opera. He expressed it by saying; "I must study war, politics, so my children can study math and science and architecture and history, so their children can study dance and drama and music and painting and poetry."

These words touched a chord in me for it is the sentiment that I sense when I talk to the people from past generations to gather stories for this newspaper. The situations that caused people to immigrate to the U.S. were as dire as those described by McCullough. Even once in America the new arrivals faced extreme challenges. And, like in the novel, the immigrants persevered in fulfilling their dreams, not necessarily for themselves but for their children and children's children.

I saw this triumph in the Percario family as Andrea left the poverty of his hometown in Italy to become a virtual orphan in America. He was not shy to tell his only son Joe how he made meals of orange peels and pigeons as a youngster. Or the intense racism he faced in America.

When Joe was in grade school, Andrea moved his family from Peterstown, the Italian neighbored in Elizabeth, to Ceder Avenue. It was a time that Italy was not yet an ally of America and Joe remembered being ostracized for being Italian. It was not a good experience. Andrea thought it was a move up from his small apartment but he did not correctly factor in the value that being in Peterstown had been.

Joe got through those rough years and assimilated in high school. He learned how to overcome adversity from his father who, relatively speaking, started out at a place much deeper in despair that Joe had.

All of Joe's sons learned to swing a hammer and work with their dad at a young age. But when his son Tony was in high school he fell off a scaffolding and broke his neck. He was layed up for over a year. He could never return to construction work and started a car dealership. Joe encouraged his son Mike to pursue a career as an attorney because he saw the need for workers to be represented. Mike became an attorney and represents injured workers.

And so it went, and so it goes. It has been the theme to many a story of the folks from Peterstown. Parents unselfishly dedicating their lives to their children, so they would have it better than them.



AMERICAN INGENUITY HAILED FROM ELIZABETH

Japan may be great at mass production but it is usually American inventions that are being produced. The marketplace is so flooded with the Japanese product that the consumer never knows its origin. The number puzzle "Sudoku" is a perfect example of an American invention being hoodwinked by Japanese industry. The only thing that is Japanese about the game is the name.

Sudoku was invented by American architect Howard Garns and first published in Dell puzzle magazines in 1979, except the puzzle was named "Number Place." A Japanese businessman saw it and did what he did best, renamed it and mass produced it.

Sudoku became a world wide phenomenon. In 2005, the *New York Post* printed the "new Japanese" craze and the popularity grew in America after it was printed in *U.S.A. Today*.

In an exclusive opportunity, *Around About Peterstown* was given the opportunity to publish, for the first time ever "Letter Place", a Sudoku type puzzle that uses letters. It is the invention of Elizabeth, NJ native Michael Anello.

Anello adapted Garns design, which is based on Euler's Latin Square concept, and expanded the possibilities. He has written a computer program that can customize the game in a variety of ways.

He has made boards that are 6x6 squares big to 12x12 squares. He can apply letters, numbers, symbols, Roman numerals, etc to the boxes.

To add an even more intriguing dimension to the game Anello uses words as the basis of the puzzle. Not only does the puzzlers have to solve the grid they must also find the word that was used. Or in some cases words. In multi-word puzzles the space between words is also factored into the grid. Puzzles with double letters offer an even different perspective on the game.

Anello is still developing the many possibilities and is ready to launch the concept with help from the right syndicator. He has also designed a program in which the player can create their own puzzles with different degrees of difficulty. He has created his first custom Letter Place Maker puzzle for his favorite hometown newspaper.



JOE PERCARIO HANDS DOWN ANDREA'S LEGACY

Joe Percario was the only son of Andrea and Lucy but expanded the family legacy with eight children of his own. Today there are 22 grandchildren and counting.

Joe was born in 1934 and grew up learning his life lessons from his father along with his trade. Like his dad Joe became a union carpenter. He was taught that he could achieve what he wanted through hard work. So Joe learned as much as he could about the construction industry. His father had cousins who came from Italy who were accomplished masons and stonecutters. Joe would apprentice with them. They worked on the most prestigious buildings like the famous Basilica in Newark, small touches of their work can be seen locally as well. The stone bridge in Warinanco Park in Roselle, NJ is their handiwork.

Andrea taught Joe at a young age to be self-sufficient. He was thirteen when he started to learn carpentry. After school he would deliver the *Elizabeth Journal*. Sixty years later he can still rattle off the streets on his route. Newspapers were 5¢ each and he would

figure out a way to keep two and before going home sell them to patrons of Pike's Tavern across from the park. Sometimes if the patron was feeling good enough he would give Joe a dime. The Elmora Theatre at the time was $8 \not\in$ to get in and this extra change would be enough for a night out on the town. Money was tight at home, so when Joe wanted a bike he earned the money to buy one. It was a lesson that served him well.

Joe had a sweetheart named Helen Demyanovich, and if he was planning to marry her and start a family he needed to earn more money. He was working inconsistently with the Union. After graduating from Thomas Jefferson High School he put a crew of a few able friends together and started hustling construction jobs. They would work any chance they could, making a modest profit because it was more important to keep busy than to try and make a killing. He officially formed a business in 1953.

His reputation grew for doing quality work at a fair price and his business grew steadily. Developers would use him once and never want to use anyone else. He

built his business on relationships.

In 1955 he and Helen were ready to be married and Uncle Sam came knocking at the same time. Joe was drafted into the army and was shipped off to Fort Dix in New Hanover, NJ where he was bunkmates with future all-pro football defensive lineman Rosey Grier. It was then off to Fort Hood, Texas with another celebrity on base in the person of Elvis Presley.

This time Helen got to stay with Joe and live on base with their first child Stacy. While stationed at Fort Hood Helen and Joe had their first son who they named Joe. After his two-year stint in the army the family of four came back to New Jersey to pick up where they had left off. They added another six children to the brood, eight total, four girls and four boys.

The pressure was on. There were eight mouths to feed but Joe wasn't worried. He stuck to the very basic lesson his father taught him and just worked hard. In the same way that he was taught by his father, Joe was teaching his children. Every one of the eight at one point worked in the business, either swinging hammers or pushing pencils. And everyone had to learn to sweep up a job site.

With the full-time commitment of Joe Jr. after he had gradated high school, there was a boon in the family business. The company bought an existing lumberyard on St. George Avenue in Linden, NJ and expanded their work force and truck fleet. Their success was validated when they won a contract to renovate the 700 houses that made up the Town of Winfield Park. They won the bid over 40 other competing contractors.

Today Joe Jr. is at the helm of the business, which is considered one of the premier home remodelers in New Jersey.







JOE PERCARIO CASE STUDY: JULY 2007 - COOLIDGE ROAD, ELIZABETH, NJ 🖟

This home on Coolidge Road in Elizabeth presented several challenges, cosmetic and functional. Mainly the owners wanted to preserve the integrity of the home's original 1925 architecture while improving the degree in which it provided shelter and energy efficiency. As always budget concerns were always under consideration. The following is a breakdown of how the improvements were made by Joe Percario General Contracting.

1. The Roof The first concern was the roof, which was deteriorated and leaky do to age. It had two layers of asphalt shingles nailed to the original cedar shingles. All three roofs were removed and replaced with a dimensional shingle that closely resembled the original cedar roof. The new GAF/ELK mfg. Dimensional Designer Shingles are replicas of the original wood shake and, made from a asphalt and fiberglass mixture of material, represent the latest in technology. The roof was installed with new absolute insulation and ventilation in mind.

2. Accents & Trim The trim work on the house was distinct. But like most of the wood some parts were deteriorated beyond repair. Historical restoration of the wood soffits would be very costly. The solution to this challenge was quite simple. Percario's maintains a huge catalog of accents and trim to fit every style of architecture. A perfect match was found for the soffits, accents, trim and even the columns.

home. With the advantages of the new roof's ventilation and insulation, half the battle to keep the house energy efficient was done.

The siding presented a different challenge. It had no insulation behind it and blowing in foam, fiberglass or cellulose was an expensive option. The house had clapboard siding on the lower half and cedar perfection shakes on the upper half. Both portions were splintering and loosening. The owner originally called to have the home painted, but because the siding was in such bad shape the paint job would have been wasteful and the cost of repairing the old wood was prohibitive.

The solution to the siding and trim challenge started with picking a clapboard and cedar shakes product that matched the exact projection, dimensions and textures of the original constructed classic home that was almost a full century old.

Stripping the paint off of one of the panels revealed the original color scheme. We wanted to ensure that the siding and trim were available in the colors we wanted.

An added bonus was that we found a full back insulated siding that could be used in leg of the blown insulation at a fraction of the price. By using siding that had an insulation backing on it, we were able to add a double layer of energy efficiency to the home.

The siding manufacture that Joe Percario recommended was Certainteed. They made all the products that fit the siding and trim criteria. Two of there products used were the 7" Full back Insulated CedarBoardsTM and the Cedar Impressions 7" perfection shake.

3. Siding Between heat escaping through the roof and the moisture, cold and heat creeping behind the siding, the owners were paying a premium in fuel bills in order to heat and cool their **4. Windows** As bad as the roof and walls were at conserving heat, the windows were twice as bad. The windows were also irregularly shaped but were beautifully design. windows were also irregularly shaped but were beautifully designed. We were able to inject insulation around the original classic windows and cap and rap them with trims and accents that were maintenance free but nostalgically correct.

The new design even enhanced the appearance of the authentic

5. Gutters The gutter system was added to the house as a renovation about five years previous to Percario's makeover. Very little thought was given to the aesthetics and functionality of the gutters and drainpipe. As evident in the before photo the drain pipes were obtrusive in appearance. A study of the system in action showed flaws in the way the rain water was funneled. Percario's reconfigured the system to work more efficiently and ultimately divert water further away from the foundation. As the after photo indicated the new gutter system s virtually invisible. Of course the blue of the leader pipes match perfectly to the siding.

6. Painting There is a pediment above the portico that is simply stunning. The low pitched gable had a sun burst painted on it. To achieve the same effect it would have to be repainted.

The fact is that Vinyl would not have had the same authentic effect, and because it is easy to reach, periodic maintenance can be easily done with paint that is perfectly mixed to match the color of

The design was painted by a highly trained Percario painter capable of doing the job with the required precision. The new door to the home was also painted, in red as was the style.



The beautiful, colorful, larger-than-life stained glass windows lighting St. Anthony's Church, each a work of art, details the fourteen Stations of the Cross. A color pocket guide was handmade and distributed recently at a dinner dance celebrating the 80th anniversary of the Church's construction.

Church staff speculates that these German made windows are one of a kind. The church, which was built in 1927, is an inviting, inspirational place to mediate and pray.

Only 250 pocket guides were made and donated for the event and the request for more has been overwhelming. Though plans may be made in the future to print more guides in color on glossy paper, a black and white version on newsprint can be cut out of this newspaper.

The size is bigger than the original and stretches over four pages. Instructions on folding are written below.







The Martino and DeIorio families have been in Roselle Park, NJ for fifty years. Their commitment to the town they love is obvious. Collectively they have

chosen to raise their families, own a business and become the mayor in the town. They have accomplished these American dreams within the fifty years of immigrating from Italy.

The Martino family lived in a small village in Italy called Arpino in the Province of Frozione, just south of Rome. The family worked as farmers for the royal family of Martinelli. They had a goal in mind to save enough money to move to America where there was opportunity for a better way of life, so they heard.

Around 1955 Alesandro Martino, his wife Adela and their teenage daughter Ilda and son Loretto took the famed Andrea Doria across the Atlantic. They were sponsored by the Belli family, cousins who lived on Pearl Street in Elizabeth, NJ. They first settled near other family members in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth, living on the second floor apartment above Sacco's Meat Market on Third Avenue.

The Belli's owned the Phillips 66 Gas station and the Martino's who were living there already, Larry and Carlo, owned ABCAR Auto Yard in Peterstown.

Ilda, commonly known as Gilda in her new home, always had dreams of owning her own business. She married Vince Delorio and moved to Roselle Park. They had three children, Carmen, Geri, and Joe.

In 1978 she purchased Galerno's Meat Market and started cooking Italian dishes using recipes her mother taught her, none of which are written down.

It's been 20 years since she started with just a small kitchen stove and hot plate and the business has grown into a popular deli and luncheonette. In 2001 the family made a major renovation to the Clay Avenue property and added a catering hall and called it La Casa di Martino.

MAYOR JOE

TO ROSELLE PARK BY WAY OF PETERSTOWN

Gilda's son Joe, a product of Roselle Park public schools, continued his education with a degree in Public Administration. He took his new knowledge and desire for public service to the people. His neighbors in Roselle Park liked his ideas about how he could improve and manage the town and elected him to the city council representing the 4th ward. It was 1990 and he was just 23 years old, the youngest councilman ever to be elected in town.

He served five years on council and felt the urge to run for mayor. The voters agreed with him once again and elected him the mayor in 1994. He is now serving his fourth term, his fourteenth year. He is the longest serving mayor of Roselle Park since 1901. He is the fourth longest serving mayor of the Union County's 21 municipalities.

Joe takes his duties as Mayor very seriously and enjoys the personal connection he can have with the citizens. like performing over 150 marriages and reading to the school children. He gets a kick out of them calling him "Mayor Joe".




LIGHTS, CAMERA, ACTION!

NUGENT'S REOPENS WITH TRADITIONS INTACT

One of the most historic taverns in Elizabeth, NJ has reopened after being closed for 15 years. Nugent's Tavern located on 844 Newark Avenue was given new life by Mike Santos, who renovated the bar to the motif of its glory days.

Joe Nugent, Sr. purchased Highway Restaurant, a converted two family house, in 1923. The popularity of the place was instant drawing blue collar workers from factories like Durant Motor Company. William Durant, one of the founders of General Motors opened a production plant directly across from the Tavern two years earlier, a three story quarter mile long facility with three shifts of workers building up a big hunger.

There was a tough row to hoe for a bit in the 1930's, Durants factory folded up and the Depression was in its dark days. But lo and behold there was a light at the end of the tunnel. With the repeal of prohibition in 1933 the Highway Restaurant had new life but now it was under the name of Nugent's Tavern. It stayed that way for 53 years.

In those early years Nugent's was a "Men only bar" but that changed as society changed. Joe and his wife Nora adapted to the times. In 1938 an addition was added, a meeting room that can accommodate women and children. The additions of a juke box and dance floor added an entire new dynamic to the tavern.

The tavern was now the go-to place for all walks of life not just the factory workers. It was the place to go to eat, to drink, to relax, to play cards or checkers, and dance.

It soon became the favorite of the police and firemen, office workers and executives alike. It was a place to see and be seen, a regular whistle stop for politicians. The addition was dubbed "Nugent's Club Room" and many organizations used the space for meetings while the patrons used it for parties.

The Durant plant had filled with different businesses throughout the years which provided a steady flow of thirsty workers, companies like General Instrument, Breeze, Vernon's Paper, Elastic Stop Nut and Burry Biscuit. Some of these factories did government work for the war effort in the 40's. The tavern was open in spite of air raid alerts and rationing. For many an immigrant, Nugent's was a home away from home. They knew they could find someone with a familiar accent.

The bartenders at Nugent's were fixtures themselves, many of them working over 20 years behind the bar, always in white shits and black ties. The kitchen was also consistent with cooks who served great hamburgers and gigantic sandwiches along with hot and cold lunch and dinners.

After WWII the Tavern enjoyed the ride to prosperity along with the rest of America. In 1956 Joe Jr. joined the staff and after a few more renovations

brought in a new era catering to a new generation. Television became a big attraction as did darts and shuffleboard. Nugent's got to sponsoring baseball and basketball teams and fielded softball teams in the city and county leagues.

In 1980 the Nugent family sold the business after 57 years. Nugent's Tavern was an integral part of Elizabeth. It was an important center of a community. A place for people to go and be part of the community. To celebrate good times and lament the tough times. Where one could always find a friend especially when help was needed. The invisible beauty to the Nugent Tavern, behind all the voice, singing and glasses clanging was the generosity the family and patrons had for charitable

After a run of 13 years under new ownership the tavern closed its doors completely. A huge void was left to be filled and that was when Mike Santos stepped up. Mike was born in Elizabeth and grew up a short distance away from the tavern. He's real proud of his Elizabeth roots, attending public school #18 and graduating form Elizabeth High School in 1992. When it was time to settle down he bought the home next door to the one he grew up in on Sheridon Avenue.

Mike is in tune with the traditions of Nugent's Tavern. It is the sense of community that he experienced growing up and that he felt still exists in Elizabeth. He imagined that if he opened the old Nugent's Tavern that the traditions will reemerge.

Opening the bar was a big move for him his first big venture. He had to check himself to see if he was making a good business move or acting on emotion. Nostalgia for the those glory days was pretty strong.

The decisive factor in Mike's decision was that he was following a dream and doing what he loved. In his eyes it could not go wrong. If he built it they will come. And built it he did. For over a year Mike was hands-on day and night restoring the place. Maintaining the integrity of the classic wood bar and fixtures while adding the amenities of today. And when he was done, they came. More than he could ever expect.

Nugent's opened with such a fanfare that regulars from decades ago came and sat down again as if they just stepped out for a breath of fresh air. The grand opening was like a family reunion.

The tavern was opened in time for 2008 St. Patrick's Day, one of the peak times for Nugent's. The entire week became a sort of homecoming. Ex-patrons came in from Boston, Virginia, Maryland and Texas. The Nugent family were in the house and a fiftieth birthday party was held for Tim McConway.

The tavern is in full swing and where the action is. There is talk that the Rocky Marciano's fight against Ezzard Charles will be broadcast on the Philco in the meeting room next Friday.



Recipes

Submitted by Erin (MacNamara) Ferrara In honor of the reopening of Nugent's Tavern

Beef and Guinness Stew

INGREDIENTS:

2 lbs. of london broil - tenderized and cut into cubes

3 tbsp. oil

salt & pepper 2 tbsp. flour

pinch of cayenne pepper

2 large onions, chopped

1 garlic clove, crushed

2 tbsp. of tomato puree dissolved in 4 tbsp. of water

1 1/4 cups Guinness Stout

2 cups largely diced carrots

sprig of fresh thyme parsley for garnish

PREPARATION:

- 1) Pre-heat oven to 300 degrees.
- 2) Trim the beef of any fat or gristle and cut into 2-inch
- 3) Toss the beef with 1 tablespoon of oil.
- 4) In a small bowl, season the flour with salt, pepper &
- 5) Toss the meat with the seasoned flour.
- 6) Heat the remaining 2 tablespoons of oil in a large skillet over high heat. Brown the meat on all sides.
- 7) Reduce the heat, add the onions, garlic and tomato puree to the skillet, cover and cook gently for 5
- 8) Transfer the contents of the skillet to a casserole and pour half the Guinness into the skillet. Bring the Guinness to a boil and stir to dissolve the caramelized meat juices on the pan.
- 9) Pour over the meat, along with the remaining guinness. Add the carrots and thyme. Stir and adjust
- 10) Cover the casserole and cook in a 300 degree oven until the meat is tender, 2 to 3 hours.
- 11) Garnish with parsley. Serve over mashed potatoes. Makes 6 servings.

INGREDIENTS:

2 pounds Ground beef, lean

1 cup Onion; diced

1 cup Carrots; diced

1 cup Celery; diced

1 1/2 cup Corn; fresh or frozen

2 cloves Garlic; minced

Salt; to taste

Pepper; to taste

1/2 teaspoon Nutmeg

8 ounces Beef broth

2 tablespoons Butter; mixed with

2 tablespoons Flour

2 pounds Potatoes; cooked and mashed Butter

PREPARATION:

- 1) Cook ground beef in frying pan until brown.
- 2) Add onion, carrots, celery, garlic, salt, pepper and nutmeg. Lower heat and cook for 10 minutes or until vegetables are wilted.

Shepherd's Pie

- 3) Add beef broth, bring to a boil.
- 4) Stir in enough of the butter/flour roux to make a thick gravy to bind the filling.
- 5) Pour into large shallow baking pan and cool. The filling should be about 1-1/2 inches deep.
- 6) Cover the meat mixture in the pan with the corn and then top with the hot mashed potatoes. Smooth potatoes evenly, brush surface with butter.
- 7) Bake at 325 F for 35-40 minutes.

V-MAIL SOOTHED THE SOUL IN WWII

The December issue of Around About Peterstown contained an article promoting correspondence with troops who are over seas. It is one of the most basic services that a regular citizen can do to support the troops. It seems very basic and inconsequential but research shows that letters from home, even from strangers, are highly valued by soldiers in active duty. This premise was reinforced recently by Lorenzo Corsi as he shares V-mail letters from World War II with the

The letters were between two brothers who were in the service and their sister, Millie who was stateside. One of Johnny's letters was from India and one of Rocky's indicated he was in Guam. Johnny and Rocky Fraine were the maternal uncles of Lorenzo's wife, Rosemarie.

V-Mail, short for Victory Mail, was the name given to a program set up to ship letters back and forth from America to troops all over the world. V-mail consisted of a standardized form that folded into its own envelope. Once written the letter would be microfilmed and approved by a censor before shipping. The process would reduce the need for valuable cargo space that would be needed to ship actual letters. According to the Smithsonian National Postal Museum 37 mail bags required to carry 150,000 onepage letters could be replaced by a single mail sack. The weight of that same amount of mail was reduced dramatically from 2,575 pounds to a mere 45.

The content of the letters are very poignant. Some times lighthearted, but mostly filled with angst. The letters express frustration with various aspects of the situation the soldiers were in. The most moving passage was Rocky asking for his sister's opinion as to if they should tell their ailing mother that he was in combat overseas. At one point he wished he had regular stationary so he can write to her. If he sent V-Mail she

The V-Mails speak of exhausting days in brutal heat. They would stop themselves from writing about the horrors. Rocky put it that "the less I write about this place the better."

Sending and receiving letters was a welcomed distraction from the drudgery. They say so a few times. Most of Johnny's and Rocky's thoughts are for their family and friends back home. John said it was Millie's job to "give him all the neighborhood gossip" and "Let Oly take care of the family news."

There was no mistake that the correspondence was highly cherished. It would not be a stretch to say that the exact same emotional need for letters from home exists today.

Below is a reprint of the December 08 article with the names of servicemen whom you could write to.

AMERICASUPPORTSYOU.MIL

Many people want to show support for our troops overseas and don't know how to go about it. The best and most secure way of sending a note or donation is to go to a website called www.americasupportsyou.mil. It is linked to the Department of Defense's site, www.defenselink.mil, and contains over 300 links to organizations that have support programs in place.

Some sites are very specific in the service they offer, for instance some groups act as a conduit between supporters and the troops. They maintain a list of soldiers and supplies that are needed and gather donations from supporters and distribute them overseas, there are other groups that take financial contributions for specific applications, and then there are those who facilitate and encourage letter and message writing.

It seems that correspondence is one of the most requested thing by soldiers. One in particular, www.anysoldier.com, will distribute letters to soldiers who get very little or no mail. This is a fantastic service and is implemented by soldiers who volunteer to receive the mail addressed to them and distribute it. This service is necessary because it is prohibited to mail a letter addressed to "Any Soldier" because of security reasons. A letter must be addressed to a specific service member using their full name, or a specific title, like Commanding Officer, Supply Officer, etc.

The cost for sending the mail overseas to military personnel is the same as regular domestic postage. It is highly recommended that anyone sending letters or packages visit either the support sites or the US Postal service site, www.usps.com, for the regulations. For instance, there are certain things that are prohibited and a customs form is required for all mail weighing 16 ounces or more.


