# WHAT BECOMES A HERO MOST

uigi Marciante, Jr. became a hero the second he decided to enlist in the army. LAmerica was in the throes of war when he volunteered. There was no question as to the risk he was taking but his sense of duty outweighed his options in civilian life.

Marciante died Sept. 20, 2007 in Muqdadiyah, Iraq, of wounds sustained when

an improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle.

Recently the term "Hero" has been over used at the risk of diluting its meaning. If criteria needs to be established in order to identify those who are worthy of the label they should start with people who sacrifice their own lives to save others. Just as a firefighter running into a burning building to rescue someone is a hero, so is the United States service men and women. The world is on fire and American soldiers are running in.

This is not like wars of past generations when forty airplanes, in tight formation, would drop 500 to 1,000 saturation bombs on a single target. America's mission is save lives not take them. The intent of Muslim Jihad Extremists is to bring death and destruction to the civilized world. America has taken on the task of quelling their aggression. The implement of war in this case is the soldier. The concern for the preservation of innocent life overrides the mission to destroy.

This tactic puts the soldiers at extreme risk. It is a difficult conscience decision but the most civilized. Some critics say our military action is too restricting and would like to see America use its full destruction capabilities. But that would be like crushing the burning house and everyone in it to squelch the fire.

The dangers our soldiers face in Iraq is unimaginable to civilians who are secure in the comfort of their lives. There must always be a constant high level of awareness and willingness to take action. The threat of the enemies plan to kill military and civilians alike is constant. Walking away is not an option for the Jihadists pursuit to destroy would not relent.

The toll this war has taken on American lives is devastating. The loss felt by the Peterstown community over the death of Luigi Marciante, or Louie as he was commonly called, will never go away. Family and friends can only search for meaning and never find the proper justification for the sacrifice Louie has made.

It is impossible to measure the potential for lost lives had America not gone to war. It is equally impossible to know if any terrorist attacks would have been made again on American soil. It has been, and certainly still is, the proclaimed mission of the enemy. Each soldier is an equal defense to that threat. They are all heroes. They all face the same risk that Louie did and they all accept it as part of their duty to their country. This acceptance is enough to be deemed a hero.

> Though Peterstown is just a small neighborhood in Elizabeth, NI it represents thousands of neighborhoods across the country that lost a loved one. There will be an end to the war one day but not before other brave sons and daughters make the ultimate sacrifice. The void left in the hearts of everyone who knew Louie can never be filled. They must hold onto his memory and make sure he is never forgotten.

Louie's wife Stephanie remembers him, in her words, ."my best friend, my husband. A devoted father to his newborn son, Lorenzo. He was a son and brother to be proud of. He loved life, and made the best out of even the worse. His presence could brighten up any room. He was always there when I needed him most. He did everything he could to always keep a smile on my face. He was so proud to be a daddy. He always talked about all the things he had planned to do with his son, and teach him."



# Editor's Opinion

The loss of Luigi Marciante was felt by many of us in Peterstown. The war in Iraq had not hit home for many people until now. I hope more people get behind the military and work towards finishing our campaign in Iraq. Too many people are complacent when it comes to the war issue. Are we so comfortable in our lives that our country at war does not effect us?

Maybe it could be looked upon as a good thing, but the military has put very little demands on the civilian population during this war. There are no rationing of fuel or scrap metal drives. During WWII women drew lines on the back of their legs to look as if they were wearing silk stockings, the height of fashion in the day. The material used to make parachutes was in short supply and so drives were organized to collect stockings.

There is no longer a need to do such things. Maybe it is a testimonial to how prosperous we are in America. I'm afraid that it has also bred complacency. I have seen it on a small scale in how neighbors don't even know each other let alone help each other. In the big picture, our military is fighting a war in spite of criticism of some of our own elected officials.

I'm not suggesting that you have to be "for" or "against" the war. First of all, that whole concept is absurd. No one is for war. But it is necessary to defend ourselves. Those who deny we are under attack are denying history and ignoring threats. Our enemy, Muslim Jihad Extremists, have vowed to destroy us.

This is not a war like any other. It is not so clear cut. Our enemy does not represent any particular country and their appearance is nondescript. One thing that is clear is they are hell bent on killing people, especially, but not only, Americans. The intention of the Jihadists is to disrupt or destroy civilization. How does one defend against that? More to the point, how does a country quell such a threat?

This is the problem facing the free world, not just America. I'm confident the greatest minds are addressing these questions, yet I have yet to hear a viable alternative to what our country is doing. I've heard criticism but no plan. There is a convenience to being a critic without having to accept the responsibility of taking decisive action.

Eventually when rational leadership replaces the radicals in place diplomatic solutions to peace can be achieved. History has proven that. But today a military solution is called for. We are meeting evil intent head on. Our enemy has given us no other option.

If the critics want an end to the war they must accept the conditions of engagement defined by our enemy. There will be no halt to suicide bombings or terrorism unless the core of the leadership of the Jehadist movement is taken down. That will take the full potential of our armed forces.

This is an unconventional war in that our military is more in a position to save lives than to destroy a country. They are faced with the task of surgically removing a cancer hidden in the body of Iraq. It is dangerous work when the cancer can explode at any

The component that is lacking from our military effort is the united support of the country. Genuine support for the troops is rare. The media and politicians have used the issue for self-aggrandizement. They are opportunists who are gaining power and political sway as critics. Politicians are the modern day war profiteers.

The Peterstown community lost a beloved son in the Iraqi war. Luigi Marciante's service to his country was honorable. His contribution will be measured every day that we live free from the threat of terrorism.



This past September, neighbors walking past 621 Third Avenue, on the Corner of John Street in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth, could catch a whiff of homemade wine easing out of the open basement door. This would not be so surprising if Lapolla's Tavern that operated out of the ground floor was still open; but it wasn't. Hasn't been for over 25 years. The passers-by must think they were imagining the aroma or maybe it was the spirit of the old Tavern revealing itself.

One curious neighbor peaked his head down the stairs and saw that the source of the smell was indeed a remnant of the past being kept alive by John Cassitta.

"Lucky John," as he is better known, is an avid wine maker producing approximately 250 gallons of wine from about 90 cases of grapes a season. He starts the process each year with help from a few friends at the end of September and finishes in a few weeks. 🎎

#### THE NAMESAKE

Michael Lapolla was born on Third Avenue in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth, NJ. He lived his entire life on that block raising a family and operating a tavern on the corner of John Street. He owned liquor license C2, the second one issued in 1933 after the end of prohibition.

The bar, named "Lapolla's", was popular for several reasons. It was

conveniently located in the center of the neighborhood. Shaffer, Reigngold and Peils flowed from the beer taps while the kitchen was busy dishing out Italian specialties like tripe and sheep's head.

It was also popular because Michael himself was a prominent figure in Elizabeth. He was active in Elizabeth politics and public service for 44 years starting right after WWI as a page in the New Jersey Legislature at the age of 18. Lapolla was elected councilman in 1947 and was appointed city treasurer in 1957, a post he held until 1960 when he took a position with the Union County Department of Public Works. Prior to opening the Tavern, Michael used the space as a meeting hall for his political club.

Michael was always accessible to his constituency and his patrons. All they had to do is yell up from the street to his apartment above the Tavern where he lived with his wife Angelina and their two children, Blaise and Rose.



#### DON PICARA IS LOOKING FOR JOE TAVERMINA'S SON, JOEL

Christine Wilson from Colonia, NJ doesn't know Joel Tavermina, or his father Joe, but she reached out to this newspaper to ask for help in finding him because she knew he was from the Peterstown section of Elizabeth. Christine is helping Don Picaro, who was her neighbor when he lived in Colonia. The 94-year-old Picaro now lives in Sante Fe, New Mexico.

Don is also from Peterstown and was a childhood friend of Joe's. They shared a similar interest in homing pigeons in their youth and it would bond them later in life unexpectedly. They both raced pigeons as members of the Greater Elizabeth Pigeon Club on South 5th Street. Don went into the service in 1942 and lost contact with his buddy Joe who was also in the military.

Picaro's assignment took him to central Europe in the thick of WWII. In 1944 he was in England where he met up with the rest of his Company. To his surprise Joe Tavermina had joined his unit. They were part of the 282nd Signal Corps Pigeon Company. The army used homing pigeons to carry messages. The two men from Peterstown were naturals for the job.

The Army Pigeon Service was located in Ft. Monmouth, NJ. On occasion, before the war, the military pigeons joined in the races run by the local clubs to race against the civilian birds. When it came time to recruit soldiers for active duty handling the army's pigeons the brass looked up the local pigeon fanciers they met at the events. Picaro and Tavermina were tapped.

The 282nd was the only Pigeon Company to go to war; most pigeon units went as platoons or squads. The use of pigeons was effective. Their ability to fly home from hundreds of miles away as quickly as they could, in any weather, made them a preferred mode of communication when radio silence had to be maintained or was not available. Pigeons can be dropped behind enemy lines where locals can then send messages back that would assist maneuvers. Stories of pigeons being responsible for saving the lives of soldiers are documented. Accounts of pigeons completing missions in spite of being wounded were also noted.

Picaro and Tavermina were together in five campaigns, including the Battle of the Bulge, December 1944, the biggest battle American soldiers fought in

Someone who was writing a story about the 282nd contacted Don Picaro. He knew Joe had a son Joel but had no idea how to find him. Don wanted to make sure Joel knew about the story being written. He wants to tell Joel about his father earning 5 Bronze Stars and



meritorious service award. Joe was also decorated at Saint Lo near Normandy, France. Eleven pigeoneers were decorated, plus one pigeon.

Picaro doesn't know when the actual written piece will surface, or where, maybe on the Internet. He is happy that the story is being told. There is very little information about the company and much would get lost as oral history. His friend Joe Tavermina has passed away but Don believes he will live through this story being written.



Stephanie Marciante recounts her life with Louie, the love they shared with each other and their son Lorenzo


We met at Ft. Lewis, WA. We were both stationed there. Louie was assigned to the 2nd Battalion 23rd Infantry Regiment 4th Brigade 2nd Infantry Division. I was assigned to the 54th Military Police Company. I guess it was just fate for us to find each other, since we had to do so clear across the country. I'm from Brick, NJ and Louie was from Elizabeth, NJ. There was another reason for each of us to join the US Army, besides to each better ourselves. We found each other in the US

Who thinks they are going to find the love of their life in the Military? When I met Louie for the first time, on June 30, 2006. Louie made me feel in a way I can't even explain. He was a sweetheart from our first hellos. We didn't officially start to date one another until July 10, 2006. And I know that for a fact because I had bought one of the little rice necklaces, and on the grain of rice was Louie's name and the date we started dating. I wore that around my neck for the longest time. We only spent a month and nine days together before we exchanged our wedding vows. But those 39 days were ones I cannot even put into words. Louie made me the happiest I have ever been. He made me feel alive again. Earlier that year before meeting Louie my unit was deployed to Iraq, in support of Operation Iraqi Freedom. And even though my tour was a short one, it was the worst experience in my life. And just a couple months after I returned to the states, there was Louie. Louie was so much fun. He made me laugh and made me smile. We had so much - actually everything in common. It was a bit scary actually. We were two peas in a pod. Well, we were married on August 19th, 2006. It was a Saturday. We married in Lakewood, WA. Right outside of Tacoma, WA. By the end of that month we had moved out of barracks and into our first apartment in


(above, 1-r) Stephanie and Louie in their class A's, November 2006.

January 9th, we found out that we were pregnant. Louie was ecstatic to find out that he was going to be a father. I knew he was going to be the best dad ever. From the day we found out we were expecting, Louie would read a bedtime story every night to the little one in my belly. It was the sweetest thing ever. Every night, until the night we found out that he had to have his bags packed and ready to get on the bird headed for Iraq.

Lorenzo while he was home. He was eating up fatherhood, and telling Lorenzo all the things his daddy was going to teach him. On Friday, August 24, 2007, Louie had a 6:40am flight out of Newark to start his journey back to Iraq. The last day I ever got to hug him and give him a kiss, and whisper in his ear how much I loved him. That was the last day I ever got to feel his

touch. After painfully letting go of him that morning, he called from Iraq a few times when he got back. He called me on Monday, September 10, 2007, at 10:02am our time. I spoke to him for 15 minutes and fifty-nine seconds. I told him how big Lorenzo was getting and how much we missed him, and how much we loved him. He told me he just got the package I had mailed to him. Who would have thought, but that was the last day that I would hear his voice, the last day ever, that I would hear him tell me that he loved me. It was five days later that I received what would become his last email ever. And in that last email he wrote to me:



hey bebe. i miss you too. dont worry daddy's coming home soon and well be a happy family, i promise. i cant believe that hes that big already he must weigh a ton, that was good that he was fine at the dr. office. hes always good. well im sorry i didnt call or write we had a commo blackout here. the guys we are replaceing where on there way back to the states and 4 of them died, but dont you worry daddys with LT crumby, i love you soooo much sweety you have no idea i think about you all day and i think about lor enzo all day and i cant stop looking at his pics cause i miss you 2 soo much. well bebe i gotta go i have guard duty. ill try to email you later on. oh if the steelers are playing tell if they won, i love you steph always and forever, give lor enzo a hug and kiss. and tell him daddy loves him

i love you for ever and ever

p.s. will you still love me in the morning?".

That was the last time I heard form Louie. His last words to me. I will keep them forever.

#### A HERO'S HONOR

After receiving visitors in Corsentino's Funeral Home the casket of Luigi Marciante was prepared for its journey to its final resting place. On September 28, 2007 Luigi Marciante was laid to rest in Brigadier General William C. Doyle Memorial Cemetery located in Arneytown, NJ.

Corsentino's Funeral Home and St. Anthony's Church are located in the Peterstown section of Elizabeth, NJ, a close-knit Italian neighborhood where the Marciante family planted their roots

Louie's mother Maria, nee Zeppieri, came to America on January 29, 1962. She was 17 years old and her first American address was 806 Third Avenue, right above Sacco's Meat Market. His father Luigi followed on April 1, 1968 to marry her. They were married on July 6, 1968 at St. Anthony's. They lived on Centre Street, in the shadow of the church. They had four children, Accursio, Ronnie, Enza and Louie who was the youngest.

In the fashion that is Peterstown, the entire community turned out to honor Louie and console his family. Louie was an American soldier and so the community was joined with people far beyond the little enclave in Elizabeth. They to arrived en masse.

It was early morning when visitors arrived at the funeral home. Military officials were already in place working with local police coordinating the daylong procession to the church and cemetery. Honor guards representing various law enforcement agencies and fire departments stood at attention. State troopers, sheriff officers, and police from various municipalities were represented including Jackson, where the Marciante's now live. It was the Elizabeth Police Department, however, who made things run smoothly.

The procession route around town was void of any parked cars. The massive caravan following the hearse had to be managed as it snaked through the streets of Elizabeth, past his old home, his grammar school, Abraham Lincoln School

#14, Hamilton Jr. High and past Elizabeth High School from where Louie graduated in 1999. Students lined the street in front of their schools as the motorcade rolled by.

The pews in the church were full with friends and neighbors along with dignitaries, including the Governor of New Jersey, Jon Corzine. The service was presided over by Bishop Marconi. In addition to the gospel reading a message was delivered by military personnel in praise of Louie's service and sacrifice. The congregation sat as his wife read a poem and each of his siblings shared their own eulogy.

The drive from the church to the cemetery used the New Jersey Turnpike. Exits were closed along the way to allow the line of over 100 cars and twenty motorcycles to move uninterrupted. Word traveled via cell phone that the funeral procession was on the move. Along the highway truckers pulled their rigs over and stood along side their cabs as the hearse passed by, some saluting others holding flags.

The simple statement from the Department of Defense announced the death of a soldier who was supporting Operation Iraqi Freedom.

Pfc. Luigi Marciante Jr., 25, of Elizabeth, N.J., died Sept. 20, 2007 in Muqdadiyah, Iraq, of wounds sustained when an improvised explosive device detonated near his vehicle. He was assigned to the 2nd Battalion, 23rd Infantry Regiment, 4th Brigade, 2nd Infantry Division, Stryker Brigade Combat Team, Fort Lewis, Washington.

Everyone knows there are volumes to be written about Louie, the lives he has touched and the positive effect his life and sacrifice will have.

In 2004, at 21 years old, Louie took charge of his life, setting goals and following through. He had aspirations of becoming a police officer like his father was, a Carabinieri,

his graduation ceremony ever so proud. Louie and I talked while on base - he talked hours about military protocols, procedures, weaponry and sweeping patterns. I could not get a word in and why bother? I just sat back and watched my younger brother shine in his moment of glory. I told him that I was so proud of him and his accomplishments - he did this on

Change once again brought him to Fort Lewis Washington where he attended specialized training. We visited him and he was cool, standing tall and becoming more confident. I just said to myself "Wow, his star is starting to shine."

We then found out that he met a certain special someone on base from NJ - Miss Stephanie Busby. We found out that they were dating, fell in love, got engaged and were married in August of last year. We met Stephanie last Christmas and just saw the magic between the two - in person and in wonderful pictures. Their love brought into the world the birth of their son Lorenzo Anthony with mommy and daddy at his side.

Part of his plan was to serve his country in the military. He knew the risks that were involved but he also knew the rewards. Louie had the heart of a patriot and considered it an honor to


In 2005, Louie was stationed in Fort Lewis, Washington. Three thousand miles away from home, the people he loved and the life he was used to. His saving grace came in the form of Stephanie Busby, a military police officer from Brick, NJ.

The attraction was equally intense and mutually instantaneous. The couple jibed in all aspects of their interests and values. It was just two months after meeting that they married, in August 2006.

In April of 2007, Stephanie was pregnant with their son Lorenzo when Louie got deployed to Iraq. Stephanie, who served a year in Iraq herself, was sad to see him leave. He returned five months later, on August 5, to witness the birth of his baby on August 11 and have him Baptized. It was a jubilant eighteen days for Louie. It made returning to Iraq emotionally difficult but sharpened his sense of completing his mission so he could return to his family.

In less than a month's time Stephanie heard the news of Louie's death. With the same swiftness that she found the love of her life she lost him.

Stephanie is a remarkable person who has accepted her fate with the emotional strength the military taught her. Louie will, no doubt, live in her heart and she will pass aspects of his fine character on to Lorenzo.



#### MAKING TOMATO SAUCE IS ALL IN THE FAMILY

Damian Serafin fancies Lina Chirichiello and has asked her to marry him. Lina, who is equally in love with Damian, thinks they are a perfect match and loves everything about him. But there was one question that Lina needed answered to really be sure that he was the one, and that was, "Can he peel tomatoes?"

It's a tradition in Lina's family to make their own tomato sauce each fall and it takes a good dozen or so to do it over two weekends. Like a young left hand pitcher being called up from the minor leagues, Damian sat in and did his part peeling tomatoes.

It was a true test of true love. The family starts out with 35 bushels the first week and another 20 the next week. When they are done they will have approximately 550 one-quart mason jars.

The process is not complex but must be done

systematically. First the tomatoes are washed, then cut and destemmed. Salt is added and they are left to soak. The tomatoes are pre-cooked so they are easier for the grinder to work with. The seeds and the skin are removed with a grinding machine. What is left is cooked again. While still hot the gravy is sealed in jars and put aside to cool. As the gravy cools and contracts a airtight seal is formed between the jar and the cap.

The operation seems more like a party than it does a day of work. It just proves the old adage, "If you like what your doing, its' not work." And being with each other is what this family likes best. Nobody loved his or her job more than Damian because he was next to Lina the entire time. Damian, because he was Polish in this Italian setting, was wondering if he passed muster. He must have really impressed Lina's family. Next year he gets to stir the pot.



Submitted by Daniel Palacio, owner of Tapas of Spain - Elizabeth, NJ

#### **Escargots Bourguignonne**

(in the style of Burgundy, as in France)

#### **INGREDIENTS** (4 Servings)

#### For Garlic Butter:

2 Tablespoons chopped fresh parsley 2 Cloves garlic, finely minced 1/2 Teaspoon Dijon mustard Freshly ground white pepper to taste 1 1/2 Sticks unsalted butter, softened 1/2 Teaspoon Worcestershire sauce 1/2 Teaspoon cognac

#### For Escargots:

24 Canned snails, drained

- 1 Medium shallot finely chopped
- 1 Tablespoon dry sherry

Salt to taste

French baguette slices

#### PREPARATION:

#### For Garlic Butter:

- 1) Combine the parsley, garlic and mustard in a food processor and season with white pepper. Process for 1 minute.
- 2) Add 1 stick of butter, the Worcestershire sauce and cognac, and process for 2 minutes.
- 3) Transfer the butter mixture to a small bowl and set aside.

#### For Garlic Butter:

- 1) Rinse the snails in a small colander under cold running water. Drain and pat dry with paper towels.
- 2) In a sauté pan, heat the remaining 1/2 stick of butter over medium heat.
- 3) Add the shallot and cook, stirring, until softened and translucent.

- 4) Add the snails and sauté until completely heated through, about one minute.
- 5) Stir in the sherry and season with salt and pepper. Remove from the heat and let cool.
- 6) Preheat the oven to 400. Transfer the snails to shells or to snail plates (if using the shells, divide them among 4 ovenproof dishes). Cover each snail completely with the reserved butter mixture.
- 7) Bake for a few minutes, or just until the snails are hot and the butter is completely melted and brown on top (do not over bake or the flavor of the butter will be compromised). Serve immediately with slices of the French baguette for dipping.

He explained that Spanish food has Mediterranean influences. For instance, the caracoles (snails) are very popular in Spain & France and the fish dish is cooked in different regions of Spain. He would serve the Escargots Bourguignonne as appetizer and the Baked Halibut on Savoy Cabbage as main course.

#### **Baked Halibut** and Savoy Cabbage

#### **INGREDIENTS**

(4 Servings)

- 1 Teaspoon extra-virgin olive oil
- 1/2 cup thinly sliced red onion
- 4 4-ounce (114 g) Halibut steaks (Note: A good substitute for halibut is salmon.)
- 1/2 Cup dry white wine or fish stock
- 1/2 Teaspoon freshly ground black pepper
- 4 Sprigs lemon thyme or 1/2 teaspoon dried lemon thyme
- 8 Savoy cabbage leaves
- 1/2 Cup plain nonfat yogurt
- 2 Teaspoons prepared horseradish
- 1 Lemon, quartered

#### **PREPARATION:**

- 1) In a large nonstick pan with a lid, heat the oil over medium heat. Add the onion and cook, stirring, until softened and translucent, 4 to 5 minutes.
- 2) Lay the halibut steaks in a single layer over the onion and add the wine or fish stock. Season with the pepper and lemon thyme. Cover tightly and cook until the fish is opaque and heated though, about 15 minutes.
- 3) Meanwhile, place the cabbage leaves in the top of a steamer set over 1 inch of boiling water. Cover and steam until the leaves soften but are still a vivid green, 8 to 10 minutes.
- 4) To serve, arrange 2 cabbage leaves on each plate. Center the halibut and onion over them and ladle some of the cooking liquid over the halibut. In a small bowl, combine the yogurt and horseradish. Spoon a dollop of the horseradish sauce on to each piece of halibut, garnish with a lemon wedge and serve immediately.
