DESIMONE ON TRACK TO EARN 12TH VARSITY LETTER

Cranford High School senior Isabella DeSimone is a four year varsity student-athlete in three sports, Swimming, Cross Country and Spring Track. On December 8th she signed a Letter of Commitment with Niagara University where she looks forward to continuing her stellar swimming career. Bella holds four Cranford High School swimming records, the 50m Freestyle, 200m Freestyle Relay, 200m Medley Relay, and 400m Freestyle Relay. In her Junior year, the team were the 2015 State Sectional Champs, the first time in school history. She was also part of the 200m Freestyle Relay team that broke the state record that year.

Bella was also part of the relay teams in track that set school records in the 4x100 and 4x800 relays. Along with earning four varsity letters, she also served as captain for all three sports teams.

Bella approaches her studies with the same intensity as her athletics and balances both with

More importantly, Bella was impressed by the quality of the school's nursing program. Compared to other schools, she found that Niagara had a high number of nursing majors, like herself, on the swim team. It seemed like a perfect fit.



CRANFORD-ELMORA SOUP KITCHEN THROWS CHRISTMAS BASH

The Cranford-Elmora Soup Kitchen is more than a hall where the working poor of the Union County area can gather for a warm, nutritious meal on a weekly basis. It is a family that seeks to welcome guests into its warmth and make them feel at home, especially during the holidays when hunger and homelessness appear in its starkest form.

The soup kitchen boasted another successful Christmas spectacular on Sunday, Dec 20th. The Food Emporium in Garwood donated 140 boxes of assorted cookies for guests to take with them to celebrate the holidays. Guests enjoyed a bountiful meal of barbeque chicken, salad, stuffing, oranges, cake from Pinho's Bakery in Roselle, buttered bread, chocolate Santas, and candy canes. The Cranford High School Madrigal Choir, led by Anthony Rafaniello, performed Christmas carols, including having some of the guests join in on the fun. Finally, Santa visited, handing out toys to the children and taking pictures.

The Cranford Jaycees were also present to assist with the festivities. For about four years, the group has helped with delivering toys and clothing through the Union County area in conjunction with the Cranford Police Department and Fire Department. This year, they collected about 1,000 toys for various churches and organizations, including Toys for Tots and the Overlook Hospital Pediatric Burn Unit. On December 20, various clothing, including hats and scarves provided by the Cranford Jaycees in conjunction with Target in Clark, were available for guests to sort through and take. Each guest

was also allowed to take home one donated toy.

On Christmas Day, the soup kitchen was again in full swing. Sixty-four guests arrived and dined on a meal of macaroni and cheese, while enjoying the welcoming company.

The Cranford-Elmora Soup Kitchen, located at 402 Union Ave, Elizabeth, began March 12, 1989 as a simple idea – Why can't a group of people put a few sandwiches together and invite some of the hungry in for lunch? Now, the strictly-volunteer soup kitchen has served more than 100,000 hot meals to the financially distressed in

the Elizabeth area. Their basic objective is to provide nutritious meals that one would find at home in a friendly atmosphere while educating volunteers, many of them children, about teamwork and how to care for their fellow man.

The soup kitchen accepts donations of socks, full size bars of soap, tooth paste, tooth brushes, deodorant, wash cloths, face towels, and other basic essentials and funding.

NEW YEAR - NEW BEGINNINGS

Annual studies repeatedly show that the most common month for individuals to file for divorce is January. The reasons for this are many and varied. Most people, for obvious reasons, do not want to address emotionally charged issues over the holiday season preferring a more peaceful Thanksgiving, Hanukkah, Christmas and New Year. For couples whose pending divorce is more driven by financial considerations, and less by emotions, there can be tax consequences which relate to the timing of filing for divorce. And still others who have come to the conclusion that the dissolution of their marriage is inevitable, often times decide that a "new year" is the best time for a "new start."

Over the course of my career as a family law attorney I have come to believe that the "best" time to make this difficult decision is when an individual is emotionally prepared and after they know that all attempts to make their marriage work have been exhausted.


On a more positive note, a recent report showed that New Jersey had the fourth lowest divorce rate (just 12.9 per 1,000 people) in the United States for 2015. Married couples in New Jersey beat the national divorce average of 16.9 per 1,000, a rate which is a 35-year low, according to the National Center for Family & Marriage Research at Bowling Green State University in

Kentucky.

The only couples more dedicated to the institution of marriage are those residing in Hawaii, Wisconsin and Rhode Island. In Hawaii, divorce rates are lowest with only 11.1 per 1,000 calling it a day, followed closely by Wisconsin (12.4 per 1,000) and Rhode Island (12.6 per 1,000). Where might you not wish to live if you want to stay together? The answer is Washington, DC which the same study confirmed had the highest divorce rate at 29.9 per 1,000. Nationwide, the divorce rate dropped significantly from 17.6 in 2014 to 16.9 in 2015 which marks the lowest rate since 1980.

Before anyone assumes that couples are now more likely to stay together for emotional or economic reasons, some researchers say that a primary reason for the decrease in divorce may be that fewer Americans are getting married at all and those who do are getting married at an older age.







VETS MEET JETS IN JERSEY

Admittedly, it doesn't happen often. Certainly, it doesn't happen enough. But when do 150 Viet Nam Veterans, representing all veterans organizations, join together to remember, to commemorate and to enjoy the company of their comrades?

The New York Jets Football organization apparently understood that. So on Sunday December 4, 2016 the NY Jets invited 150 Viet Nam Veterans to their practice facility in Florham Park, NJ. The occasion was to be honored with a 50th Anniversary of the Vietnam War Commemorative pin and to simply enjoy a terrific "Welcome Home" experience.

A buffet breakfast led the morning off, which followed a "Posting of the Colors" by the Cranford NJ VFW Post #335's Color Guard and a patriotic Pledge of Allegiance by the group. "Amazing Grace" was played meticulously by the 12 member Union County Emerald Society Pipe and Drum Corp. adding a significant degree of solemnity to the event. In keeping with that solemnity and tradition, VFW Post #335 also provided a proper MIA-POW table and empty chair in memory of those missing comrades.

The very first featured speaker, Medal of Honor recipient Jack Jacobs was welcomed with a two-minute standing round of applause. Mr. Jacobs saw his meritorious action in Kien Phong Province in 1968 while serving as an assistant battalion adviser to a South Vietnamese army unit. His moving remarks opened humorously on his lack of height, "which saved my life", and later on the patriotic aspect of being a Vietnam Veteran and the need to be proud of the experience.

Following Mr. Jacobs remarks, Major General Troy Kok head of the 99th Regional Support Command at Joint Base McGuire-Dix-Lakehurst, talked emotionally on the sacrifices that we as veterans have made and the positive consequences of our military experiences. Both speeches were met with tumultuous applause from a grateful audience of men and women Vets.

Following the speeches, a few words of thanks from the General Manager of the NY Jets, Michael Maccagnan were said and commemorative pins were handed out with a handshake and sincere "thank you" to each and every Vietnam Veteran in attendance. Afterwards all were invited to watch a brief practice on the outside practice turf by the Jets squad followed by a meet and greet autograph session with the players.

But the morning was really more than that.

"I met a guy I served with in the 173rd Airborne, that I haven't seen in 45 years" said Viet Nam Vet Billy Lueddeke from Kenilworth, NJ. "Just that, seeing him again made it an unbelievable day for me and brought back memories I haven't thought of in years". Another Vet talked of the special emotions he felt just being in the presence of so many who shared his experiences, "just chatting with the guys at the table about where they were and what they did made it for me, I was truly grateful for this day", said Mike Chmiel, Army Vet, of Cranford, NJ.

A great deal of socializing certainly took place during the breakfast. The joint comradery, the coming together of those who lived "Nam" and made it back to the "World", while remembering those souls who did not, made this a special experience and a remarkable day.

Marvin Lane of Natick, formerly of Cranford, New Jersey, died on December 5th at the age of 98 after a brief illness. Born in Philadelphia to Molly (Stein) and David Lane, he was the beloved husband of the late Alberta (Shukis) Lane, father of Andrew and Norma Lane of Natick, and David Lane and Melanie Podsiadlo of New Marlborough, MA. He was also the much-loved grandfather of Christopher, Michael, Aron, and Zoe Lane.

Marvin grew up in Philadelphia and southern New Jersey, where he developed a love of science. He graduated with distinction from the Philadelphia College of Pharmacy and Science with a degree in chemistry in 1940. He planned to pursue an advanced degree in synthetic organic chemistry but he went to work for the Permutit Co and never got back to graduate school. During World War II, he worked on war related projects including a kit for downed pilots to make a week's supply of drinkable water from sea water. He subsequently had a long career in the industrial water treatment business moving from the lab to the executive side as president of what would become the Graver Water Division of Marmon Corp. He oversaw the development of large water and waste treatment plants in the United States and around the world.

Marvin had a lifelong love of music, reading, gardening, and woodcarving. Legally blind from macular degeneration for many years, he kept his sense of humor to the very end. Donations may be made to the BrightFocus Foundation to support macular degeneration research.

CRANFORD POLICE DEPARTMENT RAISES OVER \$6,000 FOR CANCER RESEARCH

HISTORICAL SOCIETY CELEBRATING OUR 90TH ANNIVERSARY IN 2017

The Cranford Historical Society was founded by Wesley A. Stanger, Sr. and a group of local citizens interested in preserving the town's unique history. Since its founding, the Society has been dedicated to the perpetuation of Cranford's history by continuing to collect and document the town's past and present as we now enter the 21st century. The Society was chartered by the State of New Jersey on February 17, 1927, as a non-profit educational organization.

The Society's headquarters were initially located at 124 North Union Avenue, now the Crane-Phillips House Museum, until the Society moved to the Hanson House. It was the longtime home and office of Dr. Carl Hanson, a pediatrician, who opened his office here in 1934, and over five succeeding decades, provided care for hundreds of Cranford children. Dr. Hanson was a nationally recognized researcher in the field of strep throat. The Township purchased the property and then leased it to the Cranford Historical Society in 1990.

The Cranford Historical Society has maintained the Hanson House since 1990. Through a grant from Union County, matching funds from the Township of Cranford and the Society in addition to donations; the Society was able to have the Hanson House painted in 2011 in historically correct colors: green, cream trim and burgundy accents, to blend with nature. All new windows were installed, a needed stabilization. Still, work is an ongoing process to continue to preserve this "historic home."

The Society is conducted strictly in the interest of Cranford, affording opportunities for the public to become better acquainted with the past and present history of Cranford and its environment. Its only source of income is from annual dues, donations and grants. Our collections cotain many exhibits & archives, maps, documents, photographs, research library; an extensive costume and military uniform collection, providing insight into the history of Cranford. Our office is open for research during the week, Monday & Tuesday from 9:00-11:00am and Monday through Thursday from 3:30-5:30pm.

The Society is managed by the Board of Trustees, led by President Margaret Gerlach. The Board of Trustees also includes: Vice-President Mary Wade, Chairman of the Board John Dreyer, Treasurer Charles Goodfellow, Recording Secretary Barbara Klaus, Corresponding Secretary Linda Bristow, Curator Vic Bary, and Costume Curator Gail Alterman. Other Trustees are Nancy Bender, Bill Curtis, Louise Engstrom, Christine Glazer, Lori Hoffner, Jean Pascarella, and Patricia Pavlak. Our part-time office administrator keeps our office running smoothly and brings a deep knowledge of the Society and its history.

The Cranford Historical Society also maintains the Crane-Phillips House Museum, which is our primary programming site. It is a prime example of the work of Victorian architect Andrew Jackson Downing, whose book, Victorian Cottage Residences published in 1843, influenced American vernacular architecture. The museum was restored in 1998. A replica 19th

Century kitchen was installed along with interior restoration. This Victorian cottage's vibrant two-toned green and red exterior trim with peach door were uncovered and restored.

President Margaret Gerlach states, an average of 2,000 people a year visit the Museum which is across the street from the Cranford 9/11 Memorial. It is open two Sundays a month from 2:00-4:00pm from September to May and during the week by appointment only. Admission is free but donations are happily accepted. If you have not visited the museum with your family, you are cordially invited to do so. The Museum was placed on the National and State Registers of Historic Places in 1997 and was named a "Save America's Treasures" by The White House in 1999. Cranford Third Grade classes have visited the Crane-Phillips House for decades.

In 2017, the Cranford Historical Society will be celebrating our 90th Anniversary. In becoming members, you are aligning your family with one of the important educational organizations in Cranford. On behalf of myself and the Board of Trustees, we are looking forward to having you and your family joining members of the Cranford Historical Society in preserving and perpetuating the history of Cranford through our many programs and events now and in the years to come.
