# **CASA RECEIVES GIFTS DONATION FROM CRANFORD FIFTH-GRADER**

Living in foster care — away from home, friends, family and all that is familiar — is difficult enough, but during holidays, birthdays and other special days, a child's loss is magnified.

For Lisa and Bobby Hopkins, loss has become a reality. In 2015, their five-year-old daughter Ariella died after a sudden illness, just weeks

after kindergarten graduation. Since then, the in the kitchen - Mia's mom and Ariella's mom Milltown couple has worked tirelessly to keep her memory alive. The first Christmas without Ariella the family held a toy drive for children in need and CASA of Union County was among the recipients. In the last year, Ariella's favorite park was named for her, and more than 700 people celebrated Ariella Hopkins Day and raised more than \$30,000 for scholarships, veterans and their families.

Indeed, for the Hopkins, they say paying it forward means Ariella's memory lives on. This year they promised CASA of Union County enough gifts from their second annual toy drive for every child the nonprofit serves. And they delivered. Advocates chose from items donated through the Hopkins family toy drive as well as the community in response to an online CASA wish list, and wrapped and delivered them to their CASA youth in time for the holidays.

Yet, there was more forward-paying to come, with an unusual, small-world twist. When 11year-old Mia Papapietro of Cranford celebrated her birthday in December, she knew exactly what she wanted: nothing. Instead, she asked friends to give a child's gift she could donate to CASA of Union County in memory of Lisa and Bobby's Ariella.

Mia was 5 years old, according to her mom, when she first saw an empty Toys for Tots bin and insisted on remedying the issue right away. Every holiday since, Mia selects and donates a toy for charity. This year, when Mia was asked for birthday gift ideas, the fifth-grader grabbed the Ariella Hopkins toy drive flier her mom had

go way back — and exclaimed, "Mom! Let's collect for your friend's daughter!" And so it was. Mia knows Ariella's parents want to remember their daughter by making other kids smile, and she knows CASA helps children in foster care. For Mia, that's a win-win: "I hope the presents make them really happy and can make them forget some of the bad things they are going through," she said.

Marla Higginbotham, CASA's executive director, said, "When I met Bobby and Lisa Hopkins I was taken with how genuinely kind they are. They've focused their energy on keeping their daughter's memory alive, but in a way that impacts others and is meaningful for the community. Truly beautiful people doing a beautiful thing. Their hearts are full of love for their daughter in a way that makes her presence larger than themselves." Higginbotham added, "And seeing the smile on Mia's face, happy to give to our foster children gifts that could have been only hers? That's further proof of the impact one person can make. Actually, in this case, two children: Mia and Ariella. Our CASA kids may never know either girl, but because of them, they get to know a happy day, as every child should."

Since 2005, CASA of Union County has been recruiting, training, supervising and supporting community volunteers to advocate for abused, neglected and abandoned children removed from home and placed in foster care. There are 600 Union County youth in care and two-thirds still need a CASA volunteer. To learn more, contact Lisa Poris at 908-527-7048.







### **ROCK HISTORIAN WILL PRESENT TWO PROGRAMS AT LIBRARY**

Rock historian Vincent Bruno will present two programs in February on the popular music of the 1960s. Both programs will take place at the Cranford Community Center, located at 220 Walnut Avenue. The first lecture, "The Sixties: The British Invasion," will take place on Wednesday, February 15, at 7:00 p.m. and will focus on the rise of the British pop and rock acts that invaded American shores in the 1960s. From pop groups (The Beatles, The Animals, The Dave Clark 5, The Kinks) to psychedelic and progressive bands (The Who, Pink Floyd, Cream, Traffic), Mr. Bruno will explore highlights from landmark recordings that clearly defined this British pop renaissance era. From the remarkable Brill Building songwriters (Burt Bacharach, Carol King) to the art of Bob Dylan, from Phil Spector's Wall of Sound, to the California magic of Brian Wilson and the Beach Boys, Mr. Bruno will examine folk, rock, R&B, and pop, as well as the rock festivals that defined the era. Each program is two-hours long and both include audio-clips and slides.

### CATHERINE FELEGI RECIPIENT OF CRANFORD'S MARTIN LUTHER KING AWARD

Catherine Felegi, organizer of Operation Warm Heart - First Presbyterian Church of Cranford (FPCC) chapter was the recipient of the annual CLERGY COUNCIL OF CRANFORD'S MARTIN LUTHER KING AWARD. The award is given to someone who has made contributions to the cause of improving the community in such areas as civil and human rights, social justice, social action or demonstrated concern for the welfare of others. The commemorative service and award presentation was held on January 12th at the First Baptist Church of Cranford.

Felegi has always been deeply involved with helping those less fortunate, whether it was sleeping over as a volunteer for the FPCC's other sleepover program for those suffering from homelessness, FISH Hospitality Program Inc; serving at the Cranford-Elmora Soup Kitchen since 2005; or spending time at the Community FoodBank of New Jersey. She started Operation Warm Heart - FPCC chapter in Dec 2013, working closely with the Elizabeth Coalition to House the Homeless to establish a chapter in Cranford after reading an article about a man in Bridgeton, NJ who was suffering from homelessness and passed away from hypothermia after seeking warmth on a frigid night. That event combined with other personal stories drove Felegi to want to start a program to help those suffering such dire straits.

"It's frightening to think about how some people are just a fire away, an unemployment away, only a few dollars away from homelessness," states Felegi. "We as a community should feel empowered to do something to end the cycle of homelessness and to assist these people to help them rise above their current trials and be self-sufficient again." At the 2016 New Jersey Point-In-Time Count, on the night of Jan 26, 2016, 8,941 persons were experiencing homelessness with 46% reporting some sort of disability. 513 of the total individuals who were homeless were in Union County. Felegi's chapter of Operation Warm Heart works with the greater community to help empower both the volunteers, as well as the guests who sleep at the church. All volunteers find a place. Some volunteers help with basic sewing repairs, such as fixing hems and sewing buttons. Others play games with the guests to help them feel more welcome at the church. Lawyer Harry McDevitt offers legal counsel to guests in need. Social worker Mary McTernan gives helpful advice. Nurses work on a rotating schedule to give blood pressure readings. Linden resident Camilo Castillo assists with translating Spanish for anyone in need.

Cranford-Elmora Soup Kitchen coordinator Jean Wands dedicates time to give out socks and other materials that might be needed. Hair stylists Lauren Curley of Styles Street and Lynne Fitzpatrick of Guillotine Salon and Spa alternate cutting hair and trimming beards. A multitude of clothing sits on the stage of the gym where guests can search and take at their leisure. Guests are also welcome to take showers and do laundry. Various houses of worship, such as St. Mark's AME Church - Cranford, First Baptist Church -Cranford, Osceola Presbyterian Church in Clark and the Calvary Lutheran Church Confirmation class cook meals for the guests to enjoy. Every once in a while, volunteers will offer their special talents, such as Cranford-local piano instructor Mel Freda in conjunction with singer Joe Conboy, who regaled everyone with Christmas carols at the Dec 20th hosting.

Not only do people volunteer their time and energy, they also volunteer their materials. Support the Girls in Springfield donated feminine hygiene products this year for the guests to take as they need. Emily's Hats for Hope Initiative gave a large collection of hats, scarves, and gloves, all hand-made. The award-winning Vanilla Bean Creamery gave lots of ice cream for the eager guests.

"I never thought that my chapter of Warm Heart would end up being this big," states Felegi.

"It's really exciting to watch the guests and volunteers interact, watch the volunteers take this program and make it into something that is more beautiful than I could ever imagine, and see those who are benefiting from this program rise out of their current circumstances."

Felegi hopes to keep expanding and improving the program as time moves on, with the goals of making her chapter more environmentally friendly for the 2017-2018 hosting year, citing that rising sea levels could drive more than 100 million people into extreme poverty and submerge the homes of over half a billion.

"The goal is constant improvement," states Felegi. "The program will keep working to being better and better serve the homeless community."

Operation Warm Heart is a program developed by the Elizabeth Coalition to House the Homeless, which has helped find emergency housing for more than 10,000 households. Through the program, 14-20 individuals are housed in various houses of worship throughout Union County from December to March. The First Presbyterian Church of Cranford (FPCC) is continuing their commitment for its third year to aid this worthy cause.





Of the two classes, one had 19 participants, including CASA of Union County's new executive director, Marla Higginbotham. The second is the result of the nonprofit offering for the first time a five-session, intensive day training at its offices, and included nine volunteers.

The new CASA volunteers completed 30 hours of training. After performing the oaths, Judge Lindemann stepped off the bench and personally thanked each advocate for committing to serve children in need of a voice. Members of the organization's board participated, and each new advocate received a commemorative pin and certificate. During celebratory luncheons that followed, advocates were matched to their new case and learned about their youth.

Volunteers with varied backgrounds and experiences make successful advocates, and these classes are no exception: They range in age from 22 to 75 and most have no prior knowledge of the foster system. They include parents, non-parents and empty-nesters; a recent college graduate and recent retiree; careers include health professionals, school personnel, counselors, legal professionals, former military, business entrepreneurs and homemakers. Languages spoken in addition to English include Spanish, German, French and Yoruba. Several experienced abuse in their own childhoods.

William "Joe" Goodson of Plainfield, a CASA volunteer years ago who returned to help another child now that his own schedule allowed, said this work is a calling. "I know the situation in the African-American community, and I want to give back. I've been there and done that. We need more positive role models for these children who need us. I can make a difference and be someone they relate to, and that's what I'm looking for." Goodson added that on Thanksgiving, his CASA youth weighed heavily on his mind: "I'm looking at a table full of food and family and thinking of him, wondering, 'Is he ok, today?'"

CASA volunteers have court-ordered access to all parties in a child's life,

On December 14, 2016 Union County Superior Court Judge Daniel R. including foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, and incorporate into court reports findings from these contacts as well as time spent with the youth. Volunteers advocate both in the community and court to ensure their youth's needs are met and time in care is as short as possible. There are 600 Union County children currently in foster care; CASA of Union County serves approximately one-third of those and its mission is to provide an advocate for every child that needs one

## A CALL FOR HELP: OVERNIGHT VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR OPERATION WARM HEART

Our Operation Warm Heart program provides short term shelter at participating church and organization locations scattered throughout Elizabeth, Linden, Cranford, and Rahway for homeless persons who are ineligible for shelter from County Social services. The program operates from December 1 to March 31, and shelters run generally 6 p.m. to 7 a.m.

Additional overnight volunteers are needed to assist site coordinators on specific nights preferably one night a week or bi weekly. Volunteers are given basic training and primarily check in the guests for the night, direct them regarding the facilities and where to set up their cots, and occasionally assist with serving dinner. Most importantly they provide hospitality, oversight, and company to the guests for the night. Guests generally sleep from 11PM to 6AM and most volunteers work out shifts as needed. Cots, blankets, food, and transport are provided by the site or the program.

Persons to be sheltered are prescreened and provided ongoing case management and support services in order to find alternate transitional or long term housing or placement as appropriate, and as soon as possible. The program is not intended as a place for a person to shelter for the 4 months of the season. Generally, we shelter up to 14 persons, more under Code Blue circumstances. Names of those prescreened are provided to the site volunteers in advance. An agency staff person is available by phone at all times. In summary, volunteers provided a welcome human affirmation for our guests and find the experience very rewarding.
