MIKE SAVERINO RECEIVES ASSISTANCE DOG FOR 2ND TIME

Canine Companions for Independence – a national non-profit organization providing highly trained assistance dogs for children and adults with disabilities – is proud to announce that Green Brook, New Jersey resident Mike Saverino has recently received his second assistance dog from Canine Companions for Independence.


Mike was matched with Webster, a two-year-old yellow lab/ golden retriever cross who has been trained to respond to over 40 advanced commands. Mike's first Canine Companions assistance dog Akirra retired earlier this year after 8 years of loving service. His new dog Webster is aptly taking over right where Akirra left off. Webster can turn light switches on and off, open and close doors and retrieve dropped objects. However, one of his most important jobs will be to provide constant companionship for Mike.

Mike and Webster returned to Green Brook after completing Canine Companion's recent Team Training Class, an intense, two-week course held at Canine Companion's Northeast Regional Center in Medford, NY - one of six such centers nationwide. The Northeast Regional Center serves a 13state area from Maine to Virginia.

Each student who attends Team Training – held at each center four times a year - is paired with a fully trained, working assistance dog like Webster, and is taught to work with his/her canine companion. The training course consists of daily lectures, exams, practice and public outings.

Mike and Webster are settling into a routine back in Green Brook. Mike says, "Webster is a very special dog and I hope to have many wonderful years with him."

BRYAN ZHANG ADVANCES IN SPELLING BEE

Green Brook Middle School (GBMS) held the championship round of competition for the National Geographic Bee on January 19, 2017. Over four hundred students at GBMS participated in the Geo Bee and nine students made it to the school championship round. After a difficult final round of competition, including Lauren Chapleski being eliminated in third place, only Danyal Aftab and Bryan Zhang remained. Sixth grade student Bryan Zhang eventually won the school competition and now has a chance at a \$50,000 college scholarship. Bryan will now take a qualifying test to determine his eligibility for the New Jersey state Bee final on March 31, 2017.







STUDENTS SING AND DANCE WHILE RAISING FUNDS FOR PROJECT ALS

Students and teachers at Watchung Hills Teacher Laura Goodson, who died from A.L.S. Regional High School (WHRHS) demonstrated their performance skills and entertainment savvy, while raising funds for Project A.L.S. (Amyotrophic Lateral Sclerosis), at a Talent Show, Wednesday, Jan. 11, in the school's Performing Arts Center (PAC). Some 16 acts were presented for the enjoyment of the audience, including solo and group performances of song, dance, musicianship, and poetry. Three of the acts were awarded prizes in the talent show competition at the event.

First prize went to Peri Martins of Warren Township, who sang "Rise Up," by Andra Day, and accompanied herself on piano. Second prize went to Eliana Neuwirth of Warren Township, who sang, "Almost Lover," by Fine Frenzy. Third Prize went to Isabella Zhou of Warren Township, who performed a Chinese Dance to the music of the number titled, "Incense."

According to the program, the Talent Show was presented, "In loving memory of Tom Shea (1968-2012) and Jenifer Estess (1963-2003)." Shea is the late brother of WHRHS English



Two summers ago, WHRHS students read, as part of a summer reading assignment, "Tales from the Bed: A Memoir," by the late Jenifer Estess, as told to her sister, Valerie Estess. The work of non-fiction was about Jenifer Estess' battle with ALS, often also referred to as Lou Gehrig Disease. In addition, several representatives from Project ALS, including Jenifer's sisters, Valerie and Meredith Estess, spoke to assemblies of WHRHS students. WHRHS student government leaders have held several fundraising events in the last couple of years, such as this year's and previous years' Talent Shows.

"Since its inception, Project ALS has advanced ALS research, accelerating the testing of potential drugs, establishing the world's first and only privately funded stem cell laboratory and developing the first laboratory models of ALS," according to published Project ALS literature. "We have brought together the top stem cell biologists, geneticists, motor neuron experts and ALS neurologists to work on ALS and related diseases-transforming the field. In 17 years, Project ALS has raised over \$75 million, directing between 80-93 percent annually to research programs."

One of the highlights of the Talent Show was an ensemble performance of "The Room Where It Happened," from the current award-winning Broadway musical, "Hamilton." Among the performers were WHRHS History teachers Rebecca Brown, Sean New, Ken Karnas and Greg O'Reilly.

In a separate performance, Dana Wasserman and Summer Stuart sang another song from Hamilton, "Dear Theodosia."

Several singers offered solo singing performances, including: Colton Berry, "I Wonder as I Wander," by John Jacob Niles; Sarah Kelly, "I Can't Make You Love Me," by Bonnie Rait; and Michael Dumapit, "In Your Atmosphere," by John Mayer.

Several bands performed, including "Tank," comprised of Alex Overzat from WHRHS, and his friends from other schools, Nick Scafuto, and Kerry and Thomas Stranick of Bridgewater-Raritan High School, and Ben Boxer of Livingston High School. They did "Runaway," by Bon Jovi.

LOCAL AUTHOR JAMIE M. MILLER PENS SECOND CHILDREN'S BOOK

"The Boy and His Wandering Wallaby" is the follow-up children's book to 2015's "The Boy in the Yellow Raincoat", by author Jamie M. Miller. This is the second book in the series.

The first book in the series, titled, "The Boy in the Yellow Raincoat," tells the story of a little boy who has a strong dislike for rain. It is because of his Sensory Processing Disorder, a condition commonly associated with autism in which the senses are not correctly perceived in the brain and can cause an 'overload' as well as aversions to sounds, textures, lights, smells, etc. In the story, the boy is frightened of the rain's sounds, how it feels and the way it stings his skin. Within the comfort of his yellow raincoat and the love and story-telling from his mother, the boy learns to understand the positive purpose for rain and overcomes his fear by learning a new approach when handling what displeases him about the rain.

Much like "The Boy in the Yellow Raincoat," "The Boy and His Wandering Wallaby" touches on characteristics of Autism and Sensory Processing Disorder and the attachment children

can have with a specific object that they use for comfort, such as a stuffed animal. In the story, the boy and his wallaby share many adventures until one day, the boy wakes up to find his wallaby missing. He panics, but his mother once again comforts her son and promises to find the beloved toy while he is in school. At the end of the day, the boy returns home and waiting is his wallaby!

The picture books are aimed for ages Pre-K through First grade. Both stories were written with the intention of bringing awareness to understand Sensory Processing Disorders, autism and other disabilities. Miller's own son and inspiration for the books are based from his own struggles with his disorders and explaining why he was 'different' to his peers. She hopes the books will open a line of communication between a child and the person reading the stories to them and promote anti-bullying, especially to those with adversities. The boy remains nameless to act as a relatable character so that readers can envision themselves as the star to place themselves in the situation.

For both projects, Miller collaborated with illustrator and friend, Matthew J. Corrales to bring the books to life. Corrales was up for the challenge. With his artistic talent, he recreated the characters and scenes, bringing the stories to life with vivid artwork designed to capture the attention of young children and to promote question asking.

Miller will be hosting several readings of "The Boy and his Wandering Wallaby" throughout 2017 at local libraries, elementary and preschools and other events. She will kick off the "Read across America Campaign" at John P. Faber Elementary School in Dunellen at the end of February and will post future events on her Facebook page, The Boy Series. When she isn't writing, Miller is an employee of Bill Vince's V.I.P. Honda in North Plainfield.
