

with an even higher price tag. Many of our current high school students are faced with having to limit their college choices to only those they or their families can afford. "To be able to attend a highly competitive college without incurring enormous debt is a dream that every counselor has for our students," attests RHS Guidance Counselor, Cynthia Goldman. That dream has now come true for five RHS juniors who have been awarded placement in the NJ SEEDS College Scholars Class of 2017. Founded in 1992, New Jersey SEEDS is a

statewide nonprofit organization that changes the lives of high-achieving students from low-income families by transforming their educational opportunities. The SEEDS' College Scholars Program is a 17-month immersion experience, beginning in the students' junior year, designed to prepare and place these top-performing, low income students from designated public high schools in highly competitive colleges with sufficient financial aid. College Scholars participate in academic classes with New Jersey SEEDS each Saturday during the spring of their eleventh grade year and throughout twelfth grade. In addition, students take part in a three-week residential session on a college campus during the summer before their senior year in high school. Courses focus on three primary areas: academics and writing, college application support, and life skills.

Rahway's Superintendent of Schools, Dr. Patricia Camp, finds tremendous merit in this program and in its positive impact on students. "As a first generation college-educated person, I understand that what can be missing is the cultural understanding of getting into, and being successful in college. NJ SEEDS provides an intensive program that will provide our children with the college cultural understanding – this will serve them well in supporting their dreams of a higher education." To this end, high school Vice Principal Dr. Cary Fields devotes much of her time in search of similar programs which would

help students turn their dreams of attending a highly competitive university into a reality. "Providing the tools for our students to prepare themselves more easily for achieving entrance to and success in a challenging academic arena is a goal very dear to my heart."

The Rahway High School Guidance Department is proud to announce that current juniors Louis Maller, Seth Holguin, Qliver Pierre John Goodman, and Alexis Burgess were among the 22 students from 11 high schools in 9 cities admitted into the SEEDS College Scholars Class of 2017. It is clear that this award has impacted

each of them in very personal ways. Mr. Muller was "proud to have been nominated" and "gave 110% of myself to earn acceptance." He adds, "This means everything to me...my future, my life...without this I wouldn't know where I'd be." Ms. Burgess "never thought this could happen", and that the financial assistance would help her "realize my plans for becoming an engineer."

The entire Rahway community unites in offering its congratulations to these new NJ SEEDS Scholars and wishes them the highest level of success. School Superintendent Dr. Camp is "personally proud of our students who entered this competition and very excited for our 5 students who have been accepted." Her praise continues, "Great job by Dr. Fields and Ms. Goldman in guiding our students through the competitive selection process!"

Daphne vowed to learn as much as she could, through research, about this disease and has remained by her mother's side throughout her treatment, continually providing positive, strengthening support.

Capitalizing on the opportunity to reach a much broader audience afforded through her involvement in the Miss Black USA Pageant, Daphne has become a spokesperson for Multiple Myeloma Awareness in her effort toraise the public's knowledge of this particular cancer and its devastating effects. It was with this intent that she cameto speak to RHS students while emphasizing the importance of maintaining a healthy diet and an equally healthy lifestyle.

Daphne's message was especially moving for sophomore Jourdyn Mitchell who found it "inspirational and informative." Jourdyn shared that, "My grandmother passed away 5 years ago from the same cancer. This brought back so many memories for me." She expressed that she wished "to thank her for that" and that it was "nice to see how well her Mom was doing." This was indeed a gift treasured by both giver and receiver.

As of this writing, Ms. Skeete-Lee is feeling In January 2016, Daphne received the well, remaining strong and optimistic, and will be undergoing additional stem cell procedures in the upcoming month. May the new year bring her continued success as she valiantly battles this foe head on along with the knowledge that she, too, is one of Rahway's Own.

RAHWAY CHAPTER NAACP – AN ACTIVE VOICE IN COMMUNITY LIFE

During the summer of 1908, a violent two-day race riot broke out in Springfield, Illinois resulting in the death of seven people and the loss of over \$200,000 in property damage. Editorial staffs of national newspapers and magazines, who for years had been reporting news regarding brutal hate crimes in the south, were appalled by the horrific event and covered the story in graphic detail. The Springfield tragedy, which occurred in the hometown of President Abraham Lincoln, would become the catalyst for the creation of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP).

Influential leaders, both white and African-American, who for decades after the Civil War had voiced angry protests against the continued plight of African-Americans, now demanded the creation of an effective civil rights organization. With this goal in mind, a meeting in New York was scheduled for February 12, 1909, a date that would coincide with the 100th anniversary of the birth of President Lincoln. Key figures at the inception of the new group included Mary White Ovington, a wealthy American suffragist and journalist, W.E.B. DuBois, an American Socialist, civil rights activist, author and editor, Moorfield Storey, an American lawyer and civil rights leader, and Ida B. Wells, a journalist and anti-lynching crusader. The official name for the group, National Association for the Advancement of Colored People, was chosen at its 2nd Conference on May 30, 1910. A year later, the NAACP was officially incorporated with the stated mission: "To promote equality of rights and to eradicate caste or race prejudice among the citizens of the United States; to advance the interest of colored citizens; to secure for them impartial suffrage; and to increase their opportunities for securing justice in the courts, education for the children, employment according to their ability and complete equality before law."

Over the next few decades, the Association grew and local chapters were soon forming across the country. In Rahway, an NAACP charter was granted on August 13, 1934 at a meeting held at the Second Baptist Church. Leading members attending the presentation included Rev. J.W.P. Collier, Dr. Arthur Chapman, Mr. and Mrs. William P. Hammond, and Mr. and Mrs. Thomas Shell.

Early meetings of the Association were held at the Dunbar Community Center, a vacated city-owned fire house located on the corner of Milton Avenue and Augusta Street. The building, built in the 1850s, had been abandoned by the fire department in 1930 when it was deemed obsolete and in need of too many costly repairs. In 1936, city officials gave the group permission to utilize the building as a meeting hall and community center for minority groups. Four years later, however, use of the Community Center was lost when the city decided to modernize the old structure and reuse it as a fire station. Since the closing of the Dunbar Center, the group has been without a permanent home but has continued to meet in churches and meeting rooms.

Attentive to the mission of the national group, members of the Rahway Chapter have a long history of promoting equality of rights, fighting for fairness and equality in the workplace, fostering educational opportunities for children, and advancing the interests of African-Americans in the Rahway community.

The first years of the Rahway Chapter were spent on supporting antilynching protests that were being held in places throughout the United States. At the onset of World War II, with the creation of the Fair Employment Practices Commission, the local chapter monitored federal agencies, and all unions and companies engaged in war-related work to ensure their hiring practices were non-discriminatory. During the war years, the branch also furnished kits and materials to the segregated African-

American soldiers at nearby Camp Kilmer (a military facility located two miles south of New Brunswick).


In the late '40s and into the 1950s, the Branch was instrumental in the integration of the Rahway Theater and the YMCA. They joined other cities in protesting the hiring and serving practices at White Castle Restaurants and F. W. Woolworth stores. In 1958 and 1959, the young members of the Branch joined the "Youth March for Integrated Schools" in Washington, D. C. staged to support the elimination of school segregation from American Public Schools. On August 28, 1963, members of the Branch again went to D. C. to be part of the 250,000 person "March on Washington for Jobs and Freedom" and were there to hear Martin Luther King Jr. give his famous "I Have a Dream" speech.

In a challenge to the Rahway School System, the Branch fought for the transfer of 5th and 6th graders from Grover Cleveland and Columbian Elementary Schools to Madison and Roosevelt as a step in reducing racial imbalance in the grammar schools. They also pushed for a course in Black Studies to be added to the curriculum, and advocated that the contributions made by African-Americans be taught in the classroom.

The Branch has also been a "watchdog" over several city projects. They were responsible for altering the flood remediation plans proposed by the Army Corps of Engineers in the mid-1960s that would have adversely affected predominately African-American neighborhoods. The plan that was ultimately approved has proven to be much safer for all residents in the surrounding area. In the 80s and 90s, they were active in monitoring the plans and construction of the Union County Resource Recovery Facility and fought to ensure that pollution safeguards conformed to the highest standards.

In recent years the focus of the Rahway Branch NAACP has been on strengthening the quality of African-American family life in the areas of housing, education, health, and employment. Entering their 83rd year, the Rahway Branch continues to be an active civic group adhering to the mission ideals set forth by the national organization over 100 years ago.



SUCCESSFUL GARDENERING STARTS WITH THE SOIL

Whether your goal is a lush green lawn or a large harvest of vegetables, soil fertility testing is the place to start. It helps by determining a soil's pH and need for lime and fertilizer.

The best time to take a soil sample is before spring fertilization or after harvest in the fall. Do not sample shortly after a lime, fertilizer, or manure application or when the soil is excessively wet. For lawns, late summer sampling will prepare you for fall fertilization.

The Rutgers Soils Laboratory uses state-ofthe-art instruments and methods of soil analysis. They suggest soil testing be repeated every 2— 3 years.

WHY DOES SOIL PH MATTER?

Soil pH is a scale to measure how acidic or alkaline the soil is. Soil pH of 7 is neutral, below 7 is acidic and a pH above is alkaline.

Plants, vegetables and grass grow better, are healthier and produce more within their own pH range. The proper pH permits plants to absorb minerals from the soil. Evergreens require an acidic pH around 4.5 while tomatoes need a pH of 7.0.

By knowing the plant nutrition needs of your lawn and gardens, you can prevent the overapplication of fertilizers.

Soil test sampling kits are available for a fee of \$20 from most of Rutgers Cooperative Extension offices at the Garden Helpline offices. In Union County that office is located at 300 North Ave East, Westfield, NJ, on the 2nd floor. You can also purchase soil test kits by mail. For more information contact the Garden Helpline at 908-654-9852.

Separate soil samples will need to be taken from areas used to grow different types of plants. For example, separate soil test kits should be used for lawn areas and vegetable garden areas. Samples from rhododendron, azalea, and other broad leaf evergreen areas should be kept separate from other shrub areas. Also sample separately areas that have previously received different lime or fertilizer treatments and areas that are noticeably different in plant or soil quality.







On December 14, 2016 Union County

Superior Court Judge Daniel R. Lindemann administered oaths to two graduating classes of community members — among them Quanae Chambliss of Rahway — who've stepped up to serve as extra eyes and ears for Family Court judges on cases involving the county's abused, neglected or abandoned children currently in foster care. Of the two classes, one had 19 participants, including CASA of Union County's new executive director, Marla Higginbotham. The second is the result of the nonprofit offering for the first time a five-session, intensive day



The new CASA volunteers completed 30 hours of training. After performing the oaths, Judge Lindemann stepped off the bench and personally thanked each advocate for committing to serve children in need of a voice. Members of the organization's board participated, and each new advocate received a commemorative pin and certificate. During celebratory luncheons that followed, advocates were matched to their new

case and learned about their youth.

Volunteers with varied backgrounds and experiences make successful advocates, and these classes are no exception: They range in age from 22 to 75 and most have no prior knowledge of the foster system. They include parents, non-parents and empty-nesters; a recent college graduate and recent retiree; careers include professionals, school personnel, counselors, legal professionals, former military, business entrepreneurs and homemakers. Languages spoken in addition to English include Spanish, German, French and Yoruba. Several experienced abuse in their own childhoods.

William "Joe" Goodson of Plainfield, a CASA volunteer years ago who returned to help another child now that his own schedule allowed, said this work is a calling. "I know the situation in the

training at its offices, and included nine African-American community, and I want to give back. I've been there and done that. We need more positive role models for these children who need us. I can make a difference and be someone they relate to, and that's what I'm looking for." Goodson added that on Thanksgiving, his CASA youth weighed heavily on his mind: "I'm looking at a table full of food and family and thinking of him, wondering, 'Is he ok, today?'"

> CASA volunteers have court-ordered access to all parties in a child's life, including foster parents, doctors, caseworkers, therapists and teachers, and incorporate into court reports findings from these contacts as well as time spent with the youth. Volunteers advocate both in the community and court to ensure their youth's needs are met and time in care is as short as possible. There are 600 Union County children currently in foster care; CASA of Union County serves approximately one-third of those and its mission is to provide an advocate for every child that needs one.

What can one say about a man who entered high school in 1967 and, after 50 years, is still there? Ask any student, teacher or staff member at Rahway High School and you'll find the answer stated simply and unanimously, "We love him!" Adept and totally invested in all his roles as teacher, coach, mentor and, at times, "father figure", Fred Stueber has blazed a career of dedication and caring which still maintains the same fire and commitment that was demonstrated the first day he walked into a classroom.

Ironically, as Head Wrestling Coach for Rahway High School, Mr. Stueber ('Stueb' to all who know him and whose hearts he has touched) never wrestled as a high school student! His wrestling career actually began in college. He entered Rahway's then 'Junior High School' in 1966 and began his high school studies in 1967. After college, he entered the Rahway School District in 1977 as teacher and basketball coach. He later transitioned into the high school and served as Wrestling Coach in 1983. As 'Stueb' states, "The Garay family took me under their wing and made me Head Wrestling Coach in 1986," a position he now still holds with pride and devotion.

Through all the ups and downs, all the strong and not so strong years, the Coach has continued to face all obstacles with grace and dignity, never once losing his drive to see his students achieve their personal best. He believes that, "The basic kid doesn't change, only the surroundings. Now the kids have different commitments, other outlets such as work and family obligations. I had

to become more flexible." This is an adjustment which, he admits, "gets more difficult as you get older!" It is clear that this flexibility has only endeared him more to his students. Junior and Wrestling Team Captain, Sabri Murray, feels his coach "cares more about us than himself and goes way beyond for us."


He adds, "Coach Stueber is like a father figure to us; he teaches us how to get along in life." Co-Captain Jason Winters couldn't agree more. "Coach Stueber cares about us as people, how we do in school, how we do outside of school. He's not just a 'coach' in school."

Dan Garay and Jesse Campanelli were both former wrestlers on the RHS Wrestling Team and now serve as assistant wrestling coaches for Mr. Stueber. Much like the students, they share similar praise for their former high school coach. Mr. Campanelli said, "He is dedicated and motivated; he takes care of everything. Stueb is here when I get here and here when I leave. The kids respect him and know he's there for them." Mr. Garay adds, "He is a selfless, determined individual who has come through the Rahway system and remains continually focused and is a cherished part of my life."

It is only appropriate that, on January 4, 2017 Coach Stueber saw his team achieve victory, defeating Roselle Park for the first time in 30+ years. The win, according to 'Stueb', "totally changed my karma." He adds, "Now I am pumped to wrestle. This team will be special to me for the rest of my life." As he will be for them. An award no one could foresee.






