
STUDENTS DECLARE INTENT TO PLAY SPORTS IN COLLEGE

JULIA CUNNINGHAM HITS 1,000 POINTS

One of the highlights this season for Watchung Hills Regional High School Warrior Girls Basketball Team came at 5 minutes and 50 seconds in the second period of the home game against Ridge High School on Tuesday, Jan. 24, 2017. That's when with a foul shot on the back end of a "and one" three point play, Junior Julia Cunningham scored the 1,000th point of her illustrious career as a Warrior. Cunningham scored the 1,000th point on her 23rd point of the game. She went on to score 40 points in the game, which set her own personal game best record as a Warrior and set the new WHRHS school record for most points by an individual girls player in a game. Cunningham is only the second girl to amass 1,000 points in her career at WHRHS. The school record for scoring among girls basketball players is 1,234, set and held by Meghan Kopecki. Only varsity points count toward this record, Coach Kirchofer said.

"The game against Ridge was an incredible night for the Lady Warriors basketball program, but was extremely special for my family and myself," said Cunningham. "Hitting my 1,000th point was something that I had been dreaming of since I was a little kid and to break the scoring record and eclipse the 1,000th point mark in the same night was an unbelievable feeling."



ARTS CENTER PRESENTS "GALLIC JOURNEYS"

With St. Patrick's Day just around the corner, the Watchung Arts Center will present "Gallic Journeys", an exhibit of the works of New Jersey artist Judith O'Donnell, in its Lower Gallery from March 3 through March 31.

Judith O'Donnell is a fine artist residing in Stirling, New Jersey. She utilizes the medium of oils almost exclusively, but when traveling only works in watercolor and pastels. Judith paints from her sketches, but will also take a number photographs to get the overall feel and atmosphere for what she wishes to create.

While some may think that 'Gallic Journeys' would refer exclusively to Ireland, the Gallic Nations are considered to include Scotland, Wales, Ireland, Cornwall (England) and Brittany (France) and the paintings and sketches are from trips made to these countries. All watercolors were done on-site whereas the oils were painted back in the studio.

Judith's landscape and garden paintings are mostly about taking the viewer on a journey both in time and place, a good escape and a place to rest in a world that is frantic. As peace gets harder to find and we never seem to slow down, Judith feels that it becomes more important than ever to have a quiet place. That quiet place, she feels, can be as simple as looking at a restful painting.

Judith has studied at Kean College, New Jersey, but has almost exclusively studied with teachers and artists that she admires; her mentor being Margie Cochran. She has studied in the United States with Albert Bross, Adolph Conrad and Alex Piccirillo and in England with Catherine Duckworth-King and Gerald Tucker. In association with Rene Robles, with whom she

worked closely, she travelled to the Philippines for an art exhibition and jointly presented his book "Assersionisim" in which her work was featured.

Judith has had many exhibitions in the United States and overseas, both singularly and with a number of like-minded artists with whom she paints. She has previously exhibited at the Watchung Arts Center in September 2013 and June 2015



Green Brook which are or were important to be recognized for their significance. We'll start with one that no longer exists but was well known in its day.

We have talked about the Blue Hills Plantation in North Plainfield owned during the American Revolutionary days by the Vermeule brothers as a self-contained 96 acre village. But that name has since been borrowed by other entities over the years. In 1734 a farmhouse was built by Quaker Edward Fitz Randolph that was on the current Northwest corner of Woodlawn Avenue and Warrenville Road. The same Edward FitzRandolph that first guided General George Washington up to Washington Rock on June 13, 1777.

A little after 1920, a gentleman by the name of Fred Bruns had an idea unusual in its day. He bought the aforementioned farmhouse and converted it to a restaurant and a nightclub. And yes, he called it the Blue Hills Plantation. Eventually he also bought a nearby home at 198 Greenbrook Road where he resided.

It is surprising with the lack of transportation in the 1920's, the Great Depression in the 1930's,

There are several historic houses or sites in and the war years of the 1940's and subsequent gas rationing that the location was so very successful. Perhaps any entertainment in the area kept local spirits alive in our area. It is rather strange that the location was always indicated as Dunellen. Until 1932 it was physically located in North Plainfield Township before Green Brook was officially formed. Perhaps because of transportation issues, many came to the Dunellen train station and then made their way to the restaurant. Not only did people come from the Big City but many well-known personalities were often seen there. In the late 1930's and early 1940's they were drawn there to dance to the music of the famous Mace Irish's Orchestra.

> But all good things must come to an end. Our late member, Rens Eelman, recalled to us how he was with the Green Brook Fire Department one frigid December night in 1949 when the Plantation was destroyed by fire and burned to the ground.



IRS URGES PUBLIC TO STAY ALERT FOR SCAM PHONE CALLS

The IRS continues to warn consumers to guard against scam phone calls from thieves intent on stealing their money or their identity. Criminals pose as the IRS to trick victims out of their money or personal information. Here are several tips to help you avoid being a victim of these scams:

- Scammers make unsolicited calls. Thieves call taxpayers claiming to be IRS officials. They demand that the victim pay a bogus tax bill. They con the victim into sending cash, usually through a prepaid debit card or wire transfer. They may also leave "urgent" callback requests through phone "robo-calls," or via phishing
- Callers try to scare their victims. Many phone scams use threats to intimidate and bully a victim into paying. They may even threaten to arrest, deport or revoke the license of their victim if they don't get the money.
- Scams use caller ID spoofing. Scammers often alter caller ID to make it look like the IRS or another agency is calling. The callers use IRS titles and fake badge numbers to appear legitimate. They may use the victim's name, address and other personal information to make the call sound official.

- Cons try new tricks all the time. Some schemes provide an actual IRS address where they tell the victim to mail a receipt for the payment they make. Others use emails that contain a fake IRS document with a phone number or an email address for a reply. These scams often use official IRS letterhead in emails or regular mail that they send to their victims. They try these ploys to make the ruse look official.
- Scams cost victims over \$23 million. The Inspector General for Administration, or TIGTA, has received reports of about 736,000 scam contacts since October 2013. Nearly 4,550 victims have collectively paid over \$23 million as a result of the scam.

The IRS will not:

- Call you to demand immediate payment. The IRS will not call you if you owe taxes without first sending you a bill in the mail.
- Demand that you pay taxes and not allow you to question or appeal the amount you owe.
- Require that you pay your taxes a certain way. For instance, require that you pay with a prepaid
- Ask for your credit or debit card numbers over the phone.
- Threaten to bring in police or other agencies to

arrest you for not paying.

If you don't owe taxes, or have no reason to think that you do:

- Do not give out any information. Hang up
- Contact TIGTA to report the call. Use their "IRS Impersonation Scam Reporting" web page. You can also call 800-366-4484.
- Report it to the Federal Trade Commission. Use the "FTC Complaint Assistant" on FTC.gov. Please add "IRS Telephone Scam" in the notes.

If you know you owe, or think you may owe tax: • Call the IRS at 800-829-1040. IRS workers can help you.

Phone scams first tried to sting older people, new immigrants to the U.S. and those who speak English as a second language. Now the crooks try to swindle just about anyone. And they've rippedoff people in every state in the nation.

Stay alert to scams that use the IRS as a lure. Tax scams can happen any time of year, not just at tax time. For more, visit "Tax Scams and Consumer Alerts" on IRS.gov.
